Good afternoon,

I hope that you are well under these unusual circumstances.

This email is regarding a proposal to change the official name of Kemptville Creek to The South Branch River, as requested to our office by a local individual who claims that it is a better known name for the waterway, and for a longer time. I apologize for not sending this email directly to you sooner. The questionnaire link below will actually be live until a few days after April 1st, and there is some time afterward if your municipality wishes to submit a formal reply indicating its position for, against, or neutral regarding this name change proposal.

According to Ontario's historical geographic names records in our office, it was officially named South Kemptville Creek from 1947 until 1978 when it was changed to Kemptville Creek.

Background information:

I am writing to you from the geographic names program with the Ministry of Natural Resources and Forestry, supporting the Ontario Geographic Names Board (Board).

The Board's role

The Board's role in the naming of geographical features (lakes, rivers, islands, etc.) is to review applications submitted by individuals or groups, and then seek input on the proposed names from those with a local interest. The attached naming principles are based on standards developed around the world, and they are followed strictly by the Ontario Geographic Names Board when they review every name proposal received by our office. They provide a good overview of the program, and there is additional information on our website: www.ontario.ca/page/geographic-names. Geographic names that are approved by the Minister appear in government maps, publications and signs.

Engagement process

Nearby Indigenous communities, local municipalities, organizations and residents are engaged for all name proposals to determine if a traditional name is already in use for the feature. Current local usage by people the area of the feature is considered the primary principle since well known names

are most practical for navigation and emergency service delivery. The review process usually takes several months in order to gather enough information for the Board to determine whether or not to recommend a name for final approval by the Minister of Natural Resources and Forestry (Minister). Not all names are recommended for approval.

We have posted a number of questionnaires on our website to collect public input on this name proposal and other proposed names across the province and will provide links through MNRF's social media channels. The questionnaires will be posted until **April 1st**. We understand more time may be required by some communities and organizations and we will continue to engage interested parties as needed.

Ontario Geographic Names Board Principles of Geographic Naming

1. INTRODUCTION

Geographical names – or toponyms – are the result of the interaction between people and the land they inhabit. As civilisations attempt to relate to their natural environment, they attribute names to geographical features for identification and referencing purposes. Names can commemorate great persons and important events, but preserved in each name is the evidence of centuries of exploration and settlement, and the diversity of our cultural origins. Used extensively in orientation and navigation for thousands of years, names also communicate vital information about the landscape around us, including the distribution of our natural resources. They evoke great public interest and aid future generations to maintain vital connections to their past. As such, toponyms form an essential part of the cultural heritage of all Ontarians.

1.1 OFFICIAL GEOGRAPHIC NAMES

As settlement in Canada grew, the need of an authoritative body to record and disseminate information concerning geographical names became evident. Established in 1897, the Geographic Board of Canada began to standardize and officialize the geographical nomenclature of the country. Post offices and railway stations were usually given short, unambiguous designations to lower administration costs and to ensure confusion over names would not develop. Feature and place names began to appear together on maps, signs and publications to facilitate communication. As the country developed, regional and local differences became apparent, and the responsibility for geographic names as well as some government functions was transferred to the provinces and later onto the territories. For some jurisdictions, language and culture were as important to official naming as orientation and navigation.

Ontario is an excellent example of a Canadian jurisdiction with vibrant cultural diversity. This province boasts a rich and diverse history especially when it comes to matters of naming. Official names in Ontario show the equal and special significance of a number of groups who are responsible for its development, including the First Nations, the first people of this land, whose names demonstrate their intimate connection with the land for thousands of years and the French and English speech communities whose history in our province dates back to the early 1600's.

1.2 THE ONTARIO GEOGRAPHIC NAMES BOARD

Passage of the Ontario Geographic Names Board Act of 1968 by the Legislative Assembly of the Province of Ontario provided for the establishment of the Province's first independent geographical names and naming authority. The Board gathers, records and disseminates information respecting names of places and geographical features within the province; recommends to the Minister of Natural Resources for approval the names of geographical features; and orders into the record the names of places. The Board also records geographic place names and certain cultural feature names into the record that are approved by other naming authorities including: municipal names; provincial park names; geographic township names; First Nation lands; federal names such as Post Office, Railway Station, National Park, and Military Base names, amongst others. The Board does not record the names of other cultural features such as roads, trails, dams, amongst others, but is available to advise on matters relating to toponymy and to geographical naming in general.

Names recommended by the Board, approved by the Minister of Natural Resources and entered into the Board record are official for all provincial and federal maps, charts, gazetteers and related publications.

2. NAMING PRINCIPLES

The eventual recommendations and decisions of the Ontario Geographic Names Board are guided by long-standing principles whose application to specific naming recommendations is tempered by the collective opinions of its members. Many of the Board's principles have evolved from national and international naming conventions, and often balance efficient and effective communication with the needs and traditions of the various cultural groups in the province.

2.1 PRIMARY PRINCIPLES

The decisions of the Board are guided by the following primary principles, which take precedence over any other principles unless there are convincing reasons to the contrary.

2.2 UNIVOCITY

The univocity principle recognizes only one official name for a geographical entity at one time in any one language. This is an international principle, adopted by the First United Nations Conference on the Standardization of Geographical Names (1967). In subscribing to the univocity principle, the Board strives to assure that no geographical entity within its jurisdiction is referenced by more than one official name at one time, in any one language. Where multiple languages prevail, a name may be recognized officially in each language (See 2.5).

2.3 CURRENT LOCAL USAGE

A name in local usage is a name known to be used in the area immediately associated with the geographical entity. The Board gives first consideration to names that are well established and in current local usage. Ideally, for efficient and effective communication especially on maps, signs and texts, the Board supports the idea of one name for one feature, at any one time, in any one language (univocity). If more than one name is in use for a feature in a single language, the Board will normally select the name that in its opinion, has enjoyed the widest, most well established local use and acceptance – so long as that name has been in wide, well-established use for at least 20 years and the name meets other Board principles.

2.4 CURRENT COMMON USAGE

A name in common usage is a name known to be used beyond the area immediately associated with the geographical entity. In the absence of a name in current local usage, the Board gives consideration to a name that is well established in current common usage.

2.5 MULTIPLE NAMES IN DIFFERENT LANGUAGES

Dual and alternate naming recognizes the special significance of the peoples of our province including the original First Nations, and later French and English speaking settlers. Realistically, features in Ontario are sometime known by different names in different languages. Where two or more names enjoy well-established usage in different languages for the same geographic entity, the Board may consider the adoption of two or more of the names.

(a) Official Name and Alternate Official Name(s)

- Where one name enjoys greater local usage than others it will normally be recommended
 as the Official Name and the other(s) will be recommended as the Alternate Official
 Name(s).
- Alternate Official Names are normally shown on maps in brackets beside or under the Official Name space permitting.

(b) Dual Naming

- Although applied cautiously by the Board, where two names enjoy more or less equally well-established usage, the Board may consider the adoption of both names as a single name separated by a forward slash. As both parts of the single name enjoy equal status, this process conforms to the international principle of univocity one name for one place.
- In exceptional circumstances or where wholesale replacement of names may lead to confusion especially in emergency situations, a Dual Name may also be recommended in areas where current local or common usage is relatively small, but the established local or

common names are well-documented in maps and in text of the dominant language group or are of special and/or extraordinary significance to another language group in the province, e.g., First Nation names and French names on early English exploration maps of Ontario; names of First Nation spiritual sites; names applied to features to commemorate World War casualties, amongst others.

• In recognition of rights of first discovery, the Board normally places the First Nation segment of the dual name first.

2.6 NAMING IN ABSENCE OF 20 YEAR, WELL-ESTABLISHED LOCAL USAGE

New names are sometimes required to meet special situations such as the implementation of 911 emergency service systems. Where the Board has recognized the need for an official name, and the proposed name does not meet those principles listed above, the Board gives consideration to the following types of names for geographical entities in the order listed below:

- (a) Original First Nation name of the feature or placed to be named;
- (b) A name descriptive of the geographical entity that has been in well-established local use;
- (c) The restoration of a name established in the historical or traditional record;
- (d) A name that commemorates an historical event or tradition directly associated with the geographical entity; or,
- (e) A name that commemorates a person (see section 3.1 below).

3. NAMES COMMEMORATING PERSONS

The decisions of the Board to recommend and approve names commemorating persons are guided by the following:

3.1 Legacy of the Area

The Board will consider a name for a geographical entity in honour of a person who has made a significant contribution to the legacy of the area where the entity is located.

3.2 Legacy of the Province

The Board will consider a name for a geographical entity in honour of a person who has made a significant contribution to the legacy of the Province.

3.3 Legacy of the Country

The Board will consider a name for a geographical entity in honour of a person who has made a significant contribution to the legacy of the Country.

3.4 Service to the Country

The Board will consider a name for a geographical entity in honour of an Ontarian who has lost his or her life in a Canadian wartime or overseas peace keeping operation.

3.5 Acceptance

The Board will strive to assure that a name commemoration meets with the adequate support of the local or general public, and the appropriate municipal, provincial or national interest.

3.6 Living Persons

The Board does not support commemorative naming of a living person.

3.7 Deceased Persons

A person must be deceased at least 5 years before the Board will consider a commemorative name proposal.

3.8 Victims of Accidents or Tragedies

A commemorative name will not be used to commemorate the victim of an accident or tragedy unless the individual has contributed to the legacy of the area (3.1), legacy of the Province (3.2), legacy of the Country (3.3), or service to the Country (3.4).

3.9 Limits on Commemorative Naming of Persons

A commemorative name for an individual will not be considered for adoption if:

- (a) a well-established and acceptable name already exists for the feature.
- (b) a geographic feature or place has already been named after the individual in Ontario.

4. NAMES COMMEMORATING EVENTS

The decisions of the Board to recommend and approve names commemorating events are guided by the following:

4.1 Significance to Area, Province or Country

The Board will consider a name for a geographical entity to commemorate an event that was significant to

- (a) the area,
- (b) the Province,
- (c) the Country.

4.2 Elapsed Time

Ten years must have elapsed since the occurrence of the event before the Board will consider a commemorative name proposal.

4.3 Limits on Commemorative Naming of Events

A commemorative name for an event will not be considered for adoption if:

- (a) a well-established and acceptable name already exists for the feature,
- (b) a geographic feature or place has already been named after the event in Ontario.

5. OTHER PRINCIPLES

The decisions of the Board to recommend and approve names are further guided by the following:

5.1 Ownership of Land

The Board does not consider the ownership of land, in itself, to be grounds for promoting a particular name for a geographical entity.

5.2 Unacceptable Names

The Board will not recommend a name that it considers:

- (i) as derogatory; or
- (ii) might be construed as advertising or otherwise promoting a commercial enterprise or product.

5.3 Orthography

The Board will assure that the spelling and accenting of a geographical name agree with the rules of the language in which it is written. Exceptions to this rule will be properly documented. Where no standard orthography for a language exists, the Board may recommend the approval of names in a local orthography sanctioned by the local community and government.

5.4 Name Duplication

The Board will strive to avoid the duplication of names for different geographical entities that are sufficiently close to each other to cause potential confusion.

5.5 Complex Features

The Board may consider the adoption of different names for different parts or extensions of what may be considered a single geographical feature.

5.6 Distinguishing Terms

Where a name is a source of confusion because:

- (i) it has been applied to two or more geographical entities of the same kind, in what is regarded to be in the same geographical area; or,
- (ii) it is used as a single name for a geographically complex feature made up of separate parts;

The Board may consider modifying the name by applying a suitably distinguishing term (e.g., upper, lower, big, little).

Kemptville Creek to South Branch River

THE EARLY REFERENCES TO THE SOUTH BRANCH RIVER

Debate continues about whether a certain stretch of waterway should be called the Kemptville Creek, or the South Branch of the Rideau River. What can be said with some certainty is that the earliest references call it the South Branch, as distinct from the West Branch, or the main Rideau River as we call it today.

Following the takeover by Britain from the French in 1763, the area west of the Ottawa River was closed to European settlement and remained Indian Territory until the arrival of about 3,000 Loyalists refugees following the end of the American war. The Crown negotiated with the Mississauga and Mohawk people to allow these Loyalists to share the land along the north shore of the St. Lawrence, and it became important to have a proper report prepared detailing the nature of the country from a settlement standpoint.

Although it had been used by indigenous people long before Europeans arrived in North America, the first written account of the river dates from 1783, when Lieutenant Gershon French was assigned to survey the Rideau River and the lands around it, to see how suitable it would be for settlement. French was an Assistant Engineer with the Corps of Loyal Rangers, also known as "Jessup's Corps", and had served in the American War of Independence from 1776.

The British knew that the Rideau was a familiar route for indigenous travellers to go back and forth between the Ottawa and the St. Lawrence, and so French was ordered to undertake a proper survey of the route, beginning at Carillon on the Ottawa.

On October 5, 1783, he passed what he referred to as "a considerable river", joining the main Rideau from the east. This was the South Branch, which he notes "leads to a branch of the river De La Petite Nation, from whence the Indians have a communication with Oswegatchie". French led a party a short distance into what is now North Grenville, where he "found the soil good with a few Pine and Hemlock trees mixed with the timber".

A line of Townships was established along the St. Lawrence to provide land for the Loyalists, but in 1788 it was decided to grant larger tracts of territory to those militia units who had served with the British against the rebellious Americans. Not enough land was available in the river townships, so it was decided to lay out another line behind them.

On June 4, 1789, the Surveyor General, John Collins, issued instructions of Land Surveyor, John Rankin to, among other work, "2nd – To survey the South side of the Ottawa River, from the part already surveyed to the River Rideau, and forty miles on the South easterly side of the Rideau. 3rd – For the greater caution against errors arising from a mistake of distance, between the St. Lawrence and Ottawa Rivers, two traverse lines are to be run, ...[and] from the end of the forty miles on the River Rideau, on the nearest to the St. Lawrence."

The point on the Rideau forty miles from the Ottawa was the current site of Burritt's Rapids. The line Rankin drew from there to the St. Lawrence showed that enough land existed to lay out what became the Township of Oxford-on-Rideau in 1791. This work was performed by Jesse Pennoyer, who travelled, with his team, from Brockville to the Forks, where the West Branch and the South Branch of the Rideau River met.

Pennoyer's account of his travel down the South Branch may sound odd when compared with the state of the river today:

"Saturday 9th April, 1791: Put the provisions and necessaries on to the raft and into the canoes and rowed down the River about four leagues took one of the canoes and three men and went forward on the raft. Met with Mr. DePencier who told me that we were just approaching very bad rapids which he had just passed but had been obliged to unload his raft. I accordingly concluded to do so too but not being able to stop the raft it went down the rapids with all the Provisions on it. But not without imminent danger, however we lost nothing.

Sunday 10th April, 1791: Came on about 8 miles past many dangerous and difficult places without any loss.

Monday 11th: Brought the Raft and provisions round the point and up the West Branch about two miles and encamped." Note: the West Branch is the main Rideau River. Pennoyer refers to the South Branch when describing his survey work.

An 1836 map of Oxford notes the South Branch, and the only time Kemptville Creek is used on early maps is when later annotations were made. For example, the term is used in a map of 1791, but Kemptville would not exist under that name for another three decades.

It is clear from the historical record that the river was originally known as the South Branch, and was a major stream with a strong current and many falls and rapids, which was why so many mills could be established along its course, giving rise to Bishop's Mills, Oxford Mills, Perkins Mills, and Kemptville, originally Clothier's Mills.

Imagine the reaction of Merrickville residents when they are informed that they live, not on the Rideau River, but on the West Branch.



WHAT'S IN A NAME?

Well, that last editorial about the whole Kemptville Creek – South Branch River thing really stirred up the letter writers and Facebook posters of North Grenville. Though I imagine that, given the number of "Kemptville Creek!" posts, most of the correspondents live in that locality.

There were a few misunderstandings, I think, in what people were posting. First of all, no-one was suggesting that we spend money to change the name. Nor was it

being proposed that the South Branch name be introduced in order to make the waterway sound more "politically correct", as one poster thought.

To start with, whatever the state of the waterway today, it was once a fast-flowing and often dangerously turbulent river, all the way from near its sources to the Rideau. A look at old photographs certainly proves that, as well as the fact that the stream was able to power two mills at Prescott Street bridge in Kemptville, two more at Perkins Mills (Hurd Street bridge), another two in Oxford Mills, and another in Bishop's Mills.

The current state of the stream is partly a result of the changes made to the river's course by these manmade installations. It should also be noted that the dam in Oxford Mills has a lot to do with the flow even today. It is the stretch from that dam to Prescott Street bridge that has become shallow and non-navigable.

On the other point: the South Branch is the original name of the river. If it is officially Kemptville Creek today, it must have been changed some time before 1946, either by by-law, or perhaps even through unofficial use. It would be interesting to find out which. One poster stated that the South Branch of the Rideau River was a bit of a mouthful, but the popular usage was always just the South Branch. This was to distinguish it from the West Branch of the Rideau River, as it was known, which we now just call the Rideau.

Yes, time passes and things like names change. People today feel attached to a name that they have known all their lives, even though their lifetime is only a short stretch of the river's story. Nevertheless, we have lost a lot of the old attachments, what with amalgamations and expansion. Green and growing we may be, but the river was here before us all, and, Lord willing, will be here long

after we've gone. Whatever the name, it is still a wonderful part of our local community. Long may it flow.

A RIVER RUNS THROUGH IT

Some readers may have received an email recently asking them to complete a survey on renaming the river that runs through North Grenville. The Ontario Geographic Names Board Secretariat of the Ministry of Natural Resources and Forestry is seeking input from interested residents about changing the name "Kemptville Creek" to "South Branch River". I should come clean and admit that this initiative follows an application I made a few months ago. Or, as one correspondent put it: "are you behind this effort?"

The situation is this: the river that runs through North Grenville, and into North Augusta, was known as South Kemptville Creek from 1947 until 1978, when it was changed to Kemptville Creek. How, or why, this change took place is hard to understand, as pre-1998 amalgamation, the Town of Kemptville only included the river between Prescott Street bridge and just east of Curry Park. That is an extremely short stretch of waterway compared to its full length. Indeed, how South Kemptville Creek made any sense is impossible to understand.

The historical facts are these: when the Rideau River was being explored in 1783, it was noted that "A Considerable River Enters here from the East which leads to a Branch of the River de la Petite Nation from whence the Indians have a Communication to Oswegatchie...". This was the first mention of the South Branch, which was distinguished from the West Branch, which we know as the Rideau River. Clearly, it was an important waterway even then.

From 1790 on, the river was referred to as the South Branch, or the South Branch of the River Rideau. When the schedule for surveys was drawn up in January, 1791: 25 January, two of the projects listed were: "...6th To Survey and lay out a Township between the South and West Branches of the River Rideau to satisfy the Officers and others of Edwardsburg, Augusta and Elizabeth town who are desirous of Settling there.

7th To Survey and lay out a Township on the West side of the River Rideau above the junction of the two Branches, to satisfy a Number of Loyalists recommended by the Board of Luneburg and impatiently waiting to begin their Settlement".

The original surveyor of Oxford-on-Rideau described the river as follows: "The large branch of the River Rideau which runs diagonally thro the Township is called the South Branch and is navigable for canoes...".

Maps in 1815 and 1836 named the river as the South Branch. In 1862, it was called the South Branch of the Rideau River. The current official map of the United Counties of Leeds & Grenville calls it the South Branch of the Rideau River, except, oddly, calling it Kemptville Creek where it runs through Augusta Township.

Some historical maps have been vandalised by someone crossing out the name South Branch and writing in, using a red ink ballpoint pen, Kemptville Creek. The same vandal also changed the "West Branch of the River Rideau" to the "Rideau River".

Some residents want to retain Kemptville Creek because that was the name when they were growing up. Others want to keep Kemptville in the title because they think that would attract tourists more than South Branch would. There is a school of thought that thinks the river should have three names: Middle Branch for the section that flows through Bishop's Mills, and Mud Creek for the headwaters of one section.

This would be like using Ottawa River for the part that flows through Ottawa, and Pembroke River, or Mattawa River for upper reaches. Whether it is called the South Branch, or the South Branch of the Rideau River, is immaterial, either would serve. I happen to think that the South Branch would be a more functional name, and would be used even if the longer form became the official title.

There is no good reason to call the river Kemptville Creek with so very little of it actually runs through Kemptville. Some say that "creek" is a more accurate description of the river. Again, that may be true these days at certain times of the year. But the river powered many mills in its time, and they were the reason we have Kemptville, Oxford Mills, Bishop's Mills, Perkins Mills, and why so many settlers came to this part of the world to make a home. That is the true history of the river from early times. That should be the name restored to it, and it would be a far more attractive name to draw tourists and boaters using the World Heritage Site of the Rideau River. This is North Grenville and a river runs through it. That river is the South Branch.


I am writing in regards to a letter from March 3 about what to call the South Branch of the Rideau River.


The proposed modifications to the Official Plan were supported by a resolution from Village Council dated **February 8, 2021**.

RE: Reserve Transfers

OBJECTIVE:

To obtain Council's approval of transfers to and from reserves

for 2020 year end.

RECOMMENDATION:

THAT the Council of the Corporation of the Village of Merrickville-Wolford does hereby receive report FIN-07-2021 regarding reserves; and

THAT: Council approve the transfer of \$50,000 from the 2020 Capital Budget to the Carry Forward Reserve to be used for 2021 Capital projects; and

____ THAT: Council approve funding the Landfill Compactor from 2020 taxation instead of the Infrastructure Reserve.

BACKGROUND:

The Municipal Act 2001, Section 290, provides that a municipality's budget shall set out amounts to be paid into and out of reserves. When a capital project is budgeted from taxation dollars, and the project is incomplete and/or being carried into the following year's budget, then the unused amount that was budgeted for that project from taxation dollars should be transferred to a reserve account, to be used to fund the project the following year. That way, taxpayers are not taxed twice for the same project. Similarly, certain service areas such as water and wastewater services establish reserves to help fund future operating and capital needs.

ANALYSIS:

There were a couple of capital projects from 2020, totalling \$50,000, which are being carried forward to 2021 and have been included in the draft 2021 budget.

Staff recommend transferring the following amounts to the Carry-Forward reserve:

\$30,000 for VFD Fire Pump

• \$20,000 for Sanitary Pipe Repair at St. John and Main St West These amounts have been included in the 2021 draft capital budget with Reserves as their funding source.

In March 2020, the Village purchased a compactor for the Landfill, to replace the Bomag that had broken down. The 2020 budget funded the purchase with \$81,720 from taxation and \$249,000 from the infrastructure reserve. However, there was enough of a surplus at year end to allow the Village to finance the entire purchase through taxation. Staff recommend leaving the infrastructure reserve intact and are seeking Council approval to fund the entire project through 2020 taxation dollars.

CORPORATION OF THE VILLAGE OF MERRICKVILLE - WOLFORD

BY-LAW NO. 14-2021

BEING a By-law to amend By-law 30-17 of the Corporation of the Village of Merrickville-Wolford, commonly referred to as the "Procedure By-law"

WHEREAS section 5(3), the Municipal Act, 2001, S.O. 2001, c. 25, as amended, provides that a Council may exercise its powers by by-law;

AND WHEREAS section 238(2) of the *Municipal Act, 2001,* as amended, requires every municipality to pass a procedure by-law for governing the calling, place and proceedings of meetings;

AND WHEREAS the Province of Ontario enacted the *Municipal Emergency Act*, 2020, on March 19, 2020, which amended the *Municipal Act*, 2001, to provide that during emergencies, should they choose to, members of councils, local boards and committees who participate electronically in open and closed meetings may be counted for the purposes of quorum;

AND WHEREAS the Province of Ontario subsequently enacted the *COVID-19 Economic Recovery Act, 2020*, which further amended the *Municipal Act, 2001*, to provide that notwithstanding whether there is a declared State of Emergency, members of councils, local boards and committees may participate electronically in a meeting and count toward determining whether a quorum is present at a meeting;

AND WHEREAS the Council of the Corporation of the Village of Merrickville-Wolford does deem it in the best interest of the municipality to amend the procedure by-law to provide for electronic participation in a Council, local board or committee meeting;

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED THAT the Council of the Corporation of the Village of Merrickville-Wolford enacts as follows:

- 1. Section 1.2 of the Procedure By-law 30-17, regarding the "Committee" definition, shall be amended to read as follows:
 - "Committee" means a committee established by Council, including advisory committees, and as defined in the Committee's Terms of Reference.
- 2. Section 3.9 of the Procedure By-law 30-17, shall be amended to read as follows:

3.9 Electronic Meetings

- a) As per Section 238 (3.1) of the *Municipal Act, 2001*, members of Council, of a local board or of a committee of either of them may participate electronically in a meeting.
- b) As per Section 238 (3.3) (a) of the *Municipal Act, 2001*, a member of Council, of a local board or of a committee or either of them who is participating electronically in a meeting may be counted in determining whether or not quorum of members is present at any point in time.
- c) As per Section 238 (3.3) (b) of the *Municipal Act, 2001, a* member of council, of a local board or of a committee or either of them can participate electronically in a meeting that is closed to the public. Members will be responsible to take all reasonable measures to ensure security of confidential information in the event that a closed meeting is held electronically.
- d) All votes shall be recorded during an electronic meeting. Each member present, including the presiding officer, except a member who is disqualified from voting by any Act, shall announce his/her vote verbally when called, and the clerk shall record each member's name and vote.
- 2. This by-law shall be appended to By-law 30-17 which shall be consolidated for ease of reference.

THIS BY-LAW shall be deemed to come into force upon passing.
