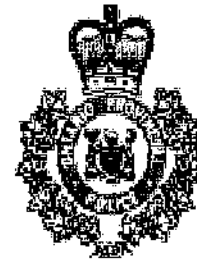

Hi Dell,

I'm just following up on this as of yet unresolved issue. With spring here and Andrewsville opened again for the season I've noticed a significant uptick in speeding along County Rd 23. As you know, the radar systems tried in the past were unsuccessful in collecting data due to technical difficulties. I had high hopes for the covert radar, and thought that after it's failure due to technical issues that they would try again when it was repaired. But this has not been the case. I would expect that these systems have been repaired by now and was wondering if we could make the case to try again? I have recently given up on this road and now drive to a quieter area for my walks for my own safety. I shouldn't have to do that but that is the reality of the situation. I would appreciate anything that can be done to improve this situation.

Even without the data, I think at the very least the municipality should consider replacing the small "Maximum 60" sign as you turn onto Cty Rd 23 with a larger sign that indicates the speed limit and says "No shoulders - Give way to pedestrians".

Hello,

I'm writing because of the excess speeding taking place along County Rd 23. Daily I walk my dog along this road between County Rd 43 and Andrewsville. On a regular basis I witness excessive speeding along this road, with most drivers going in excess of an estimated 80 km/h. Some drivers are courteous when approaching pedestrian traffic along this road, but they are in the minority.

There are virtually no shoulders along this road, forcing walkers to walk along the road itself. This creates a hazardous situation when there is oncoming traffic because there is nowhere to go but the ditch should a driver not be paying attention or there is also opposing traffic. I've had some close calls with speeding drivers not paying attention and missing me by inches! I think one countermeasure that could be used is making use of some traffic calming measures such as speed limits being painted on the road itself, larger speed limit signs, and the use of permanent traffic radar signs that I've seen in other communities such as Burritt's Rapids and along Concession Road in Kemptonville. I feel that my safety is at risk along this road and that these measures would help to control the excessive speeding along County Rd 23.

Based on my experiences along this road, I'm attaching a map

showing locations where I think
these measures would be most
effective. Let's not wait until a
pedestrian or cyclist is injured
before taking action.

LETTER TO POLICE SERVICES BOARD MERRICKVILLE.

Contact for Police services board:

DEAR JACQUES PELLETIER,

I am writing you to make you aware of issues in the Village of Merrickville, regarding the speed limit and speeding in the village.

- Speed limit is 50 km per hour.
- Most cars entering and leaving the village from County Rd 15 travel in excess of this limit. Sometimes at a dangerous level.
- Also entering from east County Rd 43, and from West County Rd 43.
- The public has now put their own signs up on their lawns to try and help reducing the speeding.
- Personally, I have lost three pets, and three visitors cars sideswiped.
- The reason I am sending this letter in print, as sooner or later there will be a bad accident to people, pets or property.
- I am also aware that the Village of Merrickville has a budget that is an amount that is paid to the Province for O.P.P. service. I will ask or enquire about the amount that is given out every year.
- Being a resident in the Village for close to 40 years, it does not take much to notice that there is very little traffic control by officers in this village at any time.
- Please forward me any activity reports from the O.P.P. that are available to the public that shows the man power used over the past year on Ride programs and Speed control.

I reside at 818 St Lawrence St. and view the speeding on a daily basis, in and out. There needs to be more done to resolve this issue, as neighbours have also complained to each other about the same.

- I have called the detachment in Kemptville, and spoken to an officer, she mentioned that yes, sometimes they come in from Cty Rd 15 travelling at 115 km an hour. But after that conversation I did not notice any campaigning from the O.P.P.
- I've lived at my address for over 12 years, and in the last 3 to 4 years I have only seen them once at this location.
- I know they are limited in man power, as I have a relative that is on the force, but why then is the Village paying for the services when we don't receive a fair coverage.
- It might be a point to review by council where it is more productive to go back and hire our own private policing officer if legal to do so.
- Kemptville, is also entered by a county road. Starting at 80 km that then drops to 60 km before entering the town then to 40 km in the town. Why can this not be instituted in Merrickville.
- The villages of North Gower and Enniskerry that I drive through have their own solar powered speed signs installed on their posts that are there 24 hours a day. Why not Merrickville.
- There are an additional 100 to 150 new homes being built within the next couple of years at the County Rd 15 entrance alone, which will have an increase of speeding trucks heading through the Village.
- There was talk a few years ago by council about rerouting truck traffic down Read St. to save the wear and tear on the Historical buildings, and that a round about or four way stop on the corner of 16 and 15. But as usually it disappears after elected.

I will close at this point of my campaign, as the provincial O.P.P. head office and the mayor told us to put it in writing. I will continue to contact my MPP and Local politicians, along with the County in writing, until we can move forward with results.

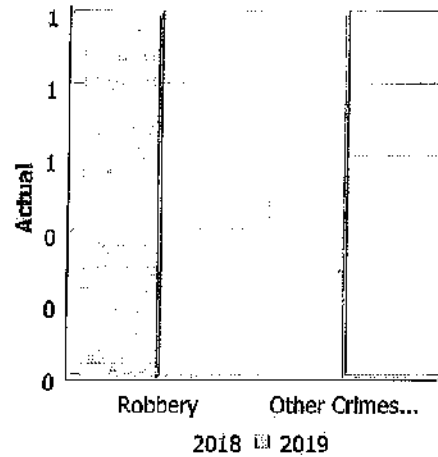
Family Dispute/Complete - solved (non-criminal)

ZONE 2 UPDATE

1. COMPREHENSIVE ONTARIO POLICE SERVICES ACT, 2019

- Bill 68, the *Comprehensive Ontario Police Services Act, 2019* received Royal Assent on March 26, 2019, however its proclamation date has not been determined yet.
- The Act creates the *Community Safety and Policing Act, 2019* and the *Special Investigations Unit Act, 2019*; it also amends the *Mandatory Blood Testing Act, 2006* and the *Coroners Act*.
- When the *Community Safety and Policing Act, 2019* comes into force it will repeal and replace the current *Police Services Act (1990)*. Until then the *Police Services Act* remains in force.
- The amendments to the *Police Services Act (1990)* that added new community safety and well-being (CSWB) planning provisions, came into force on January 1, 2019. They will continue to be in force with a new provision requiring the participation of the local chief of police (or delegate) on the Advisory Committee for the development of the plan.
- The *Comprehensive Ontario Police Services Act, 2019* also repeals the following statutes that were passed in 2018 under the previous government but had not yet come into force: *Police Services Act, 2018*, *Ontario Special Investigations Unit Act, 2018*, *Policing Oversight Act, 2018* and the *Ontario Policing Discipline Tribunal Act, 2018*.
- The *Missing Persons Act, 2018*, and *Forensic Laboratories Act, 2018*, and most of the previous amendments to the *Coroners Act* will remain as passed in the *Safer Ontario Act, 2018*.
 - An All Chiefs Memo (ACM 19-0044) went out on June 7th which confirms that the *Missing Persons Act, 2018* came into force on July 1, 2019.
- In order to bring the *Community Safety and Policing Act, 2019* into force supporting regulations must be developed to fully implement the Act. In late July, the Ministry of the Solicitor General began preparations to engage stakeholders on the new regulatory framework that will need to be developed to support the Act. Stakeholders from the policing sector and community and social services were invited to participate in engagement tables. The ministry will also set up an engagement table with First Nations partners. Engagement will be ongoing as the ministry works towards developing a robust regulatory framework. The ministry will continue to seek collaborative input from our policing partners, the public and subject matter experts on this critical next phase.

A. THE COMMUNITY SAFETY AND POLICING ACT, 2019 (CSPA, 2019)

CSPA and Oversight

- The CSPA, 2019 transforms the Office of the Independent Police Review Director (OIPRD) into the Law Enforcement Complaints Agency (LECA). Its responsibilities would include:
 - Receiving and screening public complaints involving police officers, special constables employed by the Niagara Parks Commission, peace officers employed by the Legislative Protective Service, and forwarding complaints about members of a board (e.g., municipal or First Nations) to the Inspector General of Policing (IG).
 - Assigning complaints for investigation relating to police officers, Niagara Parks Commission special constables, and peace officers employed in the Legislative Protective Service to a police service (of the officer or alternate) or an agency investigator.
 - Requiring investigative entities (e.g., chief of police) to explain delays in the completion of an investigation after 120 days and every 30 days thereafter.
- The CSPA, 2019 also establishes the office of the IG within the Ministry of the Solicitor General to monitor, inspect, and ensure compliance with the act and its regulations. The IG would also be responsible for ensuring the delivery of adequate and effective policing. It also empowers the IG to receive and review policy/service complaints.
- The IG would also be empowered to impose remedies for non-compliance with the CSPA, 2019, and board member misconduct.
- The IG would be required to forward the investigative report regarding a board member's misconduct to the entity responsible for the appointment of the board member. The IG would serve a term of five years, with the possibility of a one-term renewal of five years.

CSPA & Policing Functions

- The CSPA, 2019 stipulates that policing functions that meet the following two standards must be provided by members of a police service:
 - The policing function is either (i) crime prevention, (ii) law enforcement, (iii) emergency response, or (iv) maintaining the public peace; and
 - The function requires the exercise of the powers of a peace officer or a police officer.
- The CSPA, 2019 also:
 - mandates human rights, systemic racism, diversity and Indigenous training for new police officers, new special constables, and Police Service Board members.
 - requires police service board members to successfully complete basic training on roles and responsibilities before exercising powers and performing duties; and,
 - mandates public consultations for Lieutenant Governor in Council regulations made under the new policing and police oversight legislation.

2. COMMUNITY SAFETY AND WELL-BEING

A. COMMUNITY SAFETY AND WELL-BEING PLANNING

- New legislative requirements related to community safety and well-being (CSWB) planning came into force on January 1, 2019, as an amendment to the current *Police Services Act* (1990).
 - Municipalities have two years from the in-force date to prepare and adopt their first CSWB plan (i.e., by January 1, 2021), working in collaboration with local police services/boards and various other sectors such as health/mental health, education, community and social services, and children/youth services.
 - Municipalities have the discretion and flexibility to develop CSWB plans either individually or jointly with other municipalities or First Nation band councils.
- Schedule 2 of the COPSA, 2019 amends the CSWB planning provisions in the current *Police Services Act* (1990) and these amendments came into force immediately upon Royal Assent (i.e., March 26, 2019).
- Amendments to the CSWB planning provisions (included in Scheduled 2 of COPS Act, 2019) that came into force on March 26, 2019, include:
 - Advisory Committee:
 - The chief of police of a police force that provides policing in the area, or his or her delegate, must be included on the Advisory Committee.
 - One person may satisfy multiple representation requirements of the Advisory Committee (i.e., one person could represent a community service as well as an educational service).
 - Plans adopted before these changes to the Advisory Committee section continue to be valid despite these changes.
 - Transition:
 - A transition provision allows for plans where consultations took place before January 1, 2019, to be deemed to have met consultation obligations if the Minister determines there is substantial compliance.
 - Publication:
 - Reports relating to the CSWB plan (i.e., reports on the effect the plan is having, if any, on reducing the prioritized risk factors) must also be published on the Internet.
- In support of this, in December 2018, the Ministry released an updated version of the *Community Safety and Well-Being Planning Framework: A Shared Commitment in Ontario* booklet, which now includes reference to the new legislative requirements related to CSWB planning, a new critical success factor that highlights the importance of cultural responsiveness in the planning process, as well as a new tool to assist municipalities with the engagement of Indigenous partners as part of their municipally-led CSWB plan. The booklet is available on the Ministry's website at: <https://www.mcscs.ius.gov.on.ca/english/Publications/MCSCSSSOPanningFramework.html>
- In addition, the Ministry hosted webinars in spring 2019 to support municipal, policing, and community partners as they engage in the CSWB planning process. A recording of the webinar is available upon request.
- Further, the Canadian Municipal Network on Crime Prevention (CMNCP) has been hosting training sessions throughout the fall 2019 to assist municipalities and their planning partners in the CSWB planning process. The training has provided an opportunity for municipalities to learn about best practices from other municipalities that have already started or completed

the planning process. In order to continue our provincewide support, ministry staff have been participating in this training and delivering presentations at each session on relevant topics.

- Ministry staff continue to be available to provide direct support to communities in navigating the new legislation related to CSWB planning through interactive presentations and webinars. B. RISK-DRIVEN TRACKING DATABASE:

- The Ministry initiated the Risk-driven Tracking Database (RTD) project to provide a standardized means of gathering de-identified information on situations of elevated risk for communities implementing multi-sectoral risk-based intervention initiatives, such as Situation Tables.
- Complementary to the Ministry's Community Safety and Well-Being Planning Framework, the RTD is an important tool that can help communities collect local risk-based data that can be used to inform the community safety and well-being planning process.
- The Ministry continues to on-board new communities to the RTD. As of November 2019, 58 sites have been on-boarded.

3. ANIMAL WELFARE LEGISLATION

ANIMAL WELFARE STRATEGY

- On October 29, 2019, the Government of Ontario introduced the *Provincial Animal Welfare Services (PAWS) Act, 2019* to better protect animals from abuse and neglect by proposing the strongest penalties in Canada for offenders.
- The proposed Provincial Animal Welfare Services (PAWS) Act, 2019 would improve animal welfare by:
 - Introducing new offences to combat activities such as dog fighting;
 - Giving inspectors necessary powers to help animals in distress and to hold owners accountable;
 - Giving government the ability to empower others, beyond inspectors, to take action when an animal is in imminent risk of serious injury or death when a pet is left in a hot car;
 - Significantly increasing penalties for serious, repeat and corporate offenders. These new penalties would be the strongest in Canada;
 - Improving oversight and ensuring increased transparency and accountability, including establishing a one-window complaints mechanism for the public; and
 - Establishing a multi-disciplinary advisory table made up of a wide range of experts, including veterinarians, agriculture representatives, academics, animal advocates and others to provide ongoing advice to the ministry to improve animal welfare.

- The new enforcement model would establish a provincial enforcement team made up of a chief inspector, locally deployed provincial inspectors and specialized inspectors for agriculture, zoos, aquariums and equines. Inspectors would conduct:
 - Outreach and education on animal care best practices and how to be compliant with the legislation
 - Proactive, risk-based inspections, including, for example, of zoos and aquariums
 - Reactive inspections to respond to animal welfare concerns
 - Investigations to collect information and evidence and determine whether to lay charges.
- The new enforcement approach would also provide resources to support investigations, including:
 - Ontario Provincial Police regional specialized capacity to support major and criminal investigations.
 - Providing resources for crowns to support successful animal welfare prosecutions.
- The proposed legislation also provides clarity to local police services who would continue to be enabled to enforce animal welfare legislation.

- If passed, the government intends to bring forward transitional regulations to ensure the protection of animals while long-term regulations are developed through consultations, including with advice from the multi-disciplinary table.

4. PROVINCIAL BOARD MEMBER APPOINTMENTS

- Appointments and potential candidates are being reviewed and processed by the Office of the Solicitor General. Please be aware that reappointments are not automatic or guaranteed, regardless of the number of years served.
- In July (2018), Ontario's Public Appointments Secretariat launched a new website and online application system. The new online application allows users to create an account to apply for multiple public appointments at once, or express interest in appointments with specific agencies.
- It is recommended that you visit Ontario.ca/public appointments to sign up and create a user profile in order to keep information up-to-date, apply for other/new positions, and receive email alerts.

5. GRANTS

Community Safety and Policing (CSP) Grant

- As a result of the Ministry's recent review of its grant programs, the Ministry has developed the new, outcomes-based CSP Grant through the transformation of the following grant programs: Policing Effectiveness and Modernization (PEM), Community Policing Partnerships (CPP), Safer Communities – 1,000 Officers Partnership (1,000 Officers), Provincial Anti-Violence Intervention Strategy (PAVIS), and Supporting Police Response to Sexual Violence and Harassment (SVHAP).
 - Beginning in 2019-20, the PEM, CPP, 1,000 Officers, PAVIS and SVHAP grant programs are no longer available.
- The new CSP Grant operates on a three-year grant cycle and supports eligible police services/boards in combatting crime on a more sustainable basis. It also provides eligible police services/boards with greater flexibility to implement initiatives that address policing and community needs related to safety and well-being.
- The CSP Grant offers two funding streams – one focused on addressing local priorities and the other focused on addressing provincial priorities. Projects funded under the provincial priorities funding stream must focus on addressing gun and gang related violence, sexual violence and harassment and/or human trafficking.
- The grant is available to municipal and OPP contract police services that were eligible to receive funding under the PEM, CPP, 1,000 Officers and/or PAVIS grant programs in 2018-19.
- The Call for Applications for the 2019-20 - 2021-22 CSP Grant cycle was issued to all eligible police services on April 18, 2019. The deadline to submit applications under the local and provincial funding streams of the CSP Grant was June 6, 2019.

Successful applicants under the local priorities funding stream have been notified. Applications under the provincial priorities funding stream were reviewed by the CSP Grant Review Committees. Recommendations for funding have been approved and all recipients have been notified of the status of their applications under both streams. provincial priorities

Court Security and Prisoner Transportation (CSPT) Program

- The province has allocated a total of \$125 million in 2019 to assist municipalities in offsetting their CSPT costs.
- Funding is allocated based on each municipality's percentage share of the total provincial CSPT cost. For example, if a municipality's CSPT cost represents one per cent of the total provincial CSPT cost, then it will be allocated one per cent of the available funding. This is why allocations may vary from year to year.
- Agreements were distributed to municipalities on March 1st.
- Agreements have been fully executed and mailed back to municipalities on May 8th.
- Payment requests for the 2019 third instalments have been processed for municipalities who have submitted their 2018 Annual Financial Report.
- Agreements/funding term will expire on December 31, 2019. The ministry has not received any direction on the program for 2020 and will provide an update as soon as it becomes available.

Guns and Gangs Funding

- The province introduced Ontario's Guns, Gangs and Violence Reduction Strategy (GGVRS) to address the increase in gun violence and gang-related activity in Ontario. The GGVRS is being implemented in a phased approach that balances the government's policy objective to deliver a comprehensive and effective solution to the gun and gang crisis, with the government's fiscal priorities and commitments.
- Phase I of the GGVRS included an investment of \$25 million over four years to fight an increase in gun and gang violence in the City of Toronto (2018-19 to 2021-22). Funding was allocated to Toronto Police Service to provide them with additional digital, investigative and analytical resources necessary for fighting gun and gang violence and support Intensive Bail Firearms Teams in Toronto courthouses.
 - Most recently, on August 12, 2019, the government announced that it is authorizing up to \$1.5 million to be used by Toronto Police Service as part of the \$4.5 million in funding commitments Toronto Police Service will receive from all three levels of government.
 - On August 22, 2019 the Ministry announced \$3M over three years (2018-19 to 2020-21) of new funding for new CCTV cameras to help police respond to Toronto's recent episode of gun violence. The investment will more than double the number of cameras from 34 to 74.
- On March 26, 2019, the government announced Phase II of the GGVRS, which involves boosting local crime prevention, enforcement and prosecution across the province. An investment of approximately \$16.4 million has been made over two years in the fight against guns and gangs. This includes approximately \$11.4 million over two years from the federal government in support of Phase II.
- Phase II will equip police officers, law enforcement teams and justice partners with the resources and tools including enhancing their ability to conduct multi-jurisdictional investigations to effectively combat gun and gang-related crime. In addition, recognizing that enforcement and prosecution become more effective at combatting guns and gangs when combined with prevention and intervention, Phase II will implement initiatives that tackle root causes of violence and provide exit strategies for youth and young adults already involved in gang activity.
- Most recently, on August 26, 2019, our government and the federal government also announced an additional investment of \$54 million over three years (starting in 2020-21) that will be provided to support Ontario's GGVRS. This will further act as a deterrent to crime and aid law enforcement and justice partners to ensure that individuals responsible for gun and gang violence are promptly brought to justice. It also includes investments that promote alternatives to gangs, break the cycle of offending and prevent violence before it starts.

Reduce Impaired Driving Everywhere (R.I.D.E.) Grant

- The R.I.D.E. Grant provides funding to police services to enhance local enforcement capabilities and ensure a year-round provincial program to conduct spot checks aimed at deterring and detecting impaired drivers. The R.I.D.E. Grant has an annualized budget of \$2.4M and is intended to cover only sworn officers' overtime and paid duty R.I.D.E. activities. All municipal and First Nations police services and OPP municipal contract locations are eligible to apply for funding.
- As part of the 2018/19 – 2019/20 R.I.D.E. Grant cycle, the Ministry has approved the 2019/20 R.I.D.E. Grant funding allocations and issued agreements to 172 grantees on June 11, 2019.

- The next Call for Applications is anticipated to be in early 2020.

Proceeds of Crime – Frontline Policing (POC – FLP) Grant

- The POC – FLP Grant reinvests assets seized by the provincial and federal governments during criminal prosecutions to support front-line policing efforts related to crime prevention and community safety and well-being initiatives.
- This grant is only available to municipal and First Nation police services as well as the OPP.
- There is an eligibility requirement to partner with a minimum of two other sectors (e.g., a community mental health agency, a local social service provider, etc.).
- As part of the 2018/19 – 2019/20 POC-FLP Grant cycle, the Ministry is funding 28 projects.
- A new call for applications under POC FLP (2020-21 to 2022-23) was issued through an All Chief Memorandum on October 22, 2019. Applications are due back to the ministry on December 16th, 2019. This call for application will be the first time the province has issued the grant for three years (instead of two).

- A longer grant cycle will help provide greater sustainability of provincial funding for police services as well as ensure grant recipients are able to effectively measure outcomes and demonstrate success of initiatives

Funding under this grant program is available to municipal and First Nations police services, as well as the Ontario Provincial police, for projects that focus on at least one of the following priorities: Gun and Gang violence, Sexual Violence and Harassment, and/or Human Trafficking.

Safer and Vital Communities (SVC) Grant

- The SVC Grant provides one-time funding to incorporated non-profit/community-based organizations and First Nations Chiefs and Band Councils to implement local community safety and well-being projects.
- As part of the SVC Grant, non-profit/community-based organizations and First Nations communities are required to partner with their local police service as well as an organization from a sector different from their own on their proposed project.
- The Ministry is currently funding 26 projects as part of the 2018/19 – 2019/20 SVC Grant cycle.
- The next Call for Applications is not anticipated until later this year or early 2020.

6. APPROACH TO CONSTABLE SELECTION

- The Ministry issued an All Chiefs Memorandum 19-0063, indicating that the review of the Constable Selection System (CSS) has concluded. Furthermore, the Ministry has announced an approach to constable selection in which police service have:
 - Local flexibility to determine their hiring and selection processes: the ministry will make the existing CSS tools available, on an as-is basis, for use by police service or by organizations interested in providing pre-hire screening services (including the OACP).
 - Expert advice informing post-hire assessment at Ontario Police College (OPC): All CSS components are already assessed as part of Basic Constable Training (BCT), either through formal assessments, or through occupational tasks. As

such, an advisory body to the OPC, the Executive Education and Training Advisory Group (EETAG), is being established to provide ongoing input and feedback to the curriculum and assessments for BCT and other areas as appropriate.

- The Ministry is now working with the OACP to fully transition to the new approach.
 - As part of this move, there are additional operational changes with respect to stage two of the CSS hearing assessment, which involves the Hearing in Noise Test (HINT) conducted by the University of Ottawa.
 - Going forward, the decision to require the HINT as an assessment of a candidate's hearing abilities will be at the discretion of police services. As part of the transition, the ministry will continue to cover expenses for candidates being tested in Ottawa until January 01, 2020.
- Police services seeking more information on obtaining the CSS tools from the ministry for use in recruitment may contact Lindsey Gray, Manager – Operations Unit, at lindsey.gray@ontario.ca.

7. MAJOR CASE MANAGEMENT INSPECTION

- The Ministry is currently conducting a focused inspection on the Major Case Management (MCM) Regulation (354/04), which sets out procedures and processes for undertaking and managing investigations into major cases in accordance with the MCM Manual.
- The regulation also requires that police services use the provincial PowerCase software for managing major case investigations.
- As referenced in the All Chiefs Memorandum, 17-0078, the inspection of the MCM Regulation includes a two-pronged approach beginning with a review of closed 2016 investigations entered in PowerCase and analysis of data from the Service's Records Management System (RMS).
- The inspection notice was issued to all municipal police services at the end of January 2018 and, so far, the onsite component of the inspections of 46 municipal police services and the OPP has been completed. As always, inspection findings and recommendations will be outlined in inspection reports to be provided to the board and chief.

8. CANNABIS LEGALIZATION

- On June 6, 2019, Bill 108, *More Homes, More Choice Act, 2019* received Royal Assent and came into force on the same day. This legislation included amendments to the *Cannabis Control Act, 2017* to provide police with enhanced tools to address the illegal sale and distribution of cannabis.
- As of April 1st, 2019, the only legal means of purchasing recreational cannabis is through the online Ontario Cannabis Store (OCS) or through storefronts licensed by the Alcohol and Gaming Commission of Ontario (AGCO).

- On August 22, 2019, the Alcohol and Gaming Commission (AGCO) conducted a second licence allocation lottery to add 69 new retail cannabis stores.
- Ontario Regulation 468/18 under the *Cannabis Licence Act, 2018* was amended to reflect this new allocation. The regulation establishes that the AGCO must use a method for selecting applicants that does not rely on the discretion of the Registrar or of any other person.
 - There are currently 24 of these storefronts in operation as of November 27, 2019. An additional 69 new private cannabis retail stores are in the process of being authorized upon meeting all requirements, which will be approved to open on a rolling basis as they conclude their supply agreements with the Ontario Cannabis Store.
 - Of the 69 new private cannabis retail stores that are in the process of being authorized, 26 are allocated to First Nation reserves. The licensing and store authorization process for stores on-reserve will take place through a separate process from the lottery, on a first come, first served basis. This will bring the total number of approved private licensed retail storefronts to 93.
 - Of the 93 retail storefronts that have been authorized and are in effect, a maximum of 18 retail store authorizations are allocated in the Toronto Region; 12 in the GTA region; 12 in the East Region; 7 in North Region; 18 in the West Region; and 26 on First Nation reserves. (Note: of the 93 storefront authorizations, a total of 24 storefronts are already operational in all regions excluding First Nation reserves).

Provincial Funding for Municipalities Update:

- The Ontario Cannabis Legalization Implementation Fund (OCLIF) was created to provide \$40 million in funding over two years to help municipalities with incremental implementation costs related to the legalization of recreational cannabis.
- As of August 31, 2019, the government had completed the distribution of all OCLIF funding to municipalities that did not opt-out of hosting retail stores as of January 22, 2019, adjusted so that each recipient municipality received at least \$5,000.

Provincial Legislative Update

- On November 6, 2019, Bill 138, *Plan to Build Ontario Together Act, 2019* was tabled and passed First Reading in the Ontario Legislative Assembly. The bill proposes amendments to the *Cannabis Control Act, 2017*, *Cannabis Licence Act, 2018* and the *Ontario Cannabis Retail Corporation Act, 2017*, among other statutes.
- On November 27, 2019, the Bill went through Second Reading and was ordered referred to the Standing Committee on Finance and Economic Affairs, pursuant to the Order of the House.

Federal Developments – New Legislation and amendments to the Canada Gazette:

Bill C-93 - An Act to provide no-cost, expedited record suspensions for simple possession of cannabis

- An Act to provide no-cost, expedited record suspensions for simple possession of cannabis (formerly known as Bill C-93) came into force on August 1, 2019.

- The Act permits Canadians who have been previously convicted only of simple cannabis possession to apply for a pardon (also known as a record suspension) with no application fee or wait period, once their sentence has been served.
- Individuals convicted only of simple possession of cannabis can now apply to the Parole Board of Canada (PBC) for a pardon through a streamlined, simplified process. The \$631 fee and five-year waiting period associated with pardon applications have been eliminated. Applicants will be eligible even if they have outstanding fines or surcharges associated with their conviction, as long as they have completed the rest of their sentence.
- This Act amends the *Criminal Records Act* to, among other things, allow persons who have been convicted under the *Controlled Drugs and Substances Act*, the *Narcotic Control Act* and the *National Defence Act* merely of simple possession of cannabis offences committed before October 17, 2018 to apply for a record suspension without being subject to the period required by the *Criminal Records Act* for other offences or to the fee that is otherwise payable to the PBC in applying for a suspension.

Announcement by Health Canada about *The Regulations Amending the Cannabis Regulations (New Classes of Cannabis)*

- On June 14, 2019, Health Canada announced *The Regulations Amending the Cannabis Regulations (New Classes of Cannabis)*, which establish new regulatory controls to address the public health and public safety risks associated with edible cannabis, cannabis extracts and cannabis topicals.
- The amended regulations introduce a series of controls including restrictions on product composition and ingredients, tetrahydrocannabinol (THC) limits and new requirements pertaining to promotion, packaging and labelling, good production practices and record keeping. These amendments will also enable a comprehensive range of product forms, consistent with the objective of enabling the legal industry to displace the illegal industry. The amended regulations came into force on October 17, 2019.
- In conjunction with the release of the new regulations, a new Cannabis Tracking System (CTS) Order has been issued to enable the collection of necessary data on the new cannabis products. The new CTS Order, which will apply to participants in the legal supply chain, came into force at the same time as the amended regulations, on October 17, 2019.
- The new regulations allow for a broad variety of product forms, consistent with the Government's objective of displacing the illegal market, subject to regulatory controls to reduce public health and public safety risks. The amendments to the Cannabis Regulations control the production and sale of three new cannabis products: Edible cannabis, such as baked goods and beverages, Cannabis extracts, such as vaping liquids, tinctures, wax, hash and cannabis oil and Cannabis topicals, such as creams, lotions and balms, and similar products that are meant to be applied to a person's skin, hair or nails.
- As a result, the Ontario Cannabis Retail Corporation (Ontario Cannabis Store) can now purchase these new classes of cannabis and sell them online. Federal cannabis processing licence holders are now also able to begin submitting new product notifications to Health Canada.
- The earliest date new products could be available for purchase by the Ontario Cannabis Store is projected to be December 16, 2019.
- The anticipated timing for new product classes to be available for sale to the public through AGCO-licensed private retailers and the Ontario Cannabis Store online channel is projected to be mid-January 2020.

9. RECENT ALL CHIEFS MEMORANDA (ACMS)

- On September 4, 2019, the ministry distributed an All Chiefs Memorandum (19-0067) – which outlined changes to fees for Basic Constable Training and senior course fees.
- On September 12, 2019, the ministry distributed an All Chiefs Memorandum (19-0071), entitled “Final Federal Regulations for the Production and Sale of Cannabis Edibles, Extracts and Topicals”.
- On October 17, 2019, regulations under the *Cannabis Act* (Canada) were amended to add new classes of cannabis (edibles, extracts and topicals). As per these amendments, the Ontario Cannabis Retail Corporation (Ontario Cannabis Store) is able to purchase these new classes of cannabis and sell them online. The ACM also summarized the remaining associated timelines:
 - **October 17, 2019:** Regulations and Order came into force, and federal cannabis processing licence holders were able to begin submitting new product notifications to Health Canada.
 - **December 16, 2019:** Earliest date new products could be available for purchase by the Ontario Cannabis Store.
 - **Mid-January 2020:** Anticipated timing for new product classes to be available for sale to the public through AGCO-licensed private retailers and the Ontario Cannabis Store online channel.

a) Chief Garry Hull, Gananoque Police Service

**Re: Describing the Police Service he leads, the challenges of a small
department and his relationship with the Police Services Board**

- The Police Services Board meets monthly;
- Reviewed the Service's vision and mission statements;

- The community safety plan was completed in May 2019
- Reviewed factors affecting the community / police service:
 - It's a border Town so they have dealings with Canada Boarder Services Agency
 - Their population increases 2-3 times in the summer due to the cottages in the area
 - Casino – creates no issues for the police
 - Training requirements increases the demands on a small service; training has to be completed on overtime due to the small size of the force;
- The Service is currently piloting a digital evidence management system;

8. Updates

a) David Tilley, Police Services Advisory, Ministry of the Solicitor General

Mr. Tilley provided information on the following issues:

- Comprehensive Ontario Police Services (COPS) Act, 2019 – the regulations need to be developed before COPS Act can take effect in January 2021. Regulation tables have begun. Regulations will be completed in phases. OPP Boards are in Phase 2 which will commence late winter after the OPP Summit. The OAPSB is involved in all engagement tables;
- On October 29th, the government introduced the Provincial Animal Welfare Services Act, 2019. It will establish a provincial enforcement team comprised of a Chief Inspector and provincial inspectors. The proposed legislation is available for review on the Legislative Assembly website. The link will be provided to the Secretary;
- In terms of provincial appointments, if your appointment expires, unless you get a temporary extension or a new Order in Council, you cannot continue in this capacity. David will reach out the Appointments Unit to determine the status of various appointments if you reach out to him. The Government starts looking for new appointees 2 years out. There is nothing in the legislation stipulating a 2-term limit. Boards need to be proactive and know when their appointments are up.
- Grants:
 - Community Safety and Policing Grant – applications under the provincial stream have been approved and all recipients have been notified of the status of applications;
 - Proceeds of Crime Grant – applications are due December 16, 2019 to the Ministry of the Solicitor General
- As per the All Chiefs Memo issued November 13, 2019, Zone 2 has been assigned a new Police Services Advisor, Graham Wight who will be taking over January 1, 2020 graham.wight@ontario.ca 416-817-1347

Chairperson Fennell thanked Mr. Tilley for his service to Zone 2 and wished him well in his future endeavours.

b) King Yee, OAPSB Zone 2 Director

Mr. Yee provided information on the following issues:

- The Ministry is making changes in the areas of adequate and effective policing in Bill 68 though it does not include changes relating to court security.
- Commented on the recent Labour Conference hosted by the OAPSB held in October. OAPSB has the presentations on its website. Information at the conference was provided regarding:

Dear Mayor:

As you may know, on March 26, 2019, Ontario passed the *Comprehensive Ontario Police Services Act, 2019* (Bill 68), which established the *Community Safety and Policing Act, 2019* (CSPA, 2019). The CSPA, 2019 supports our government's commitment to:

- Modernize Ontario's police service delivery framework;
- Strengthen public confidence in policing; and
- Improve governance, training, and transparency.

I am writing to update you on the work that is currently underway to bring the CSPA, 2019 into force in 2021, and inform you of upcoming engagement opportunities.

We are engaging a number of our stakeholders, to develop more than 50 required matters for regulation. These include several Ontario Provincial Police (OPP) related matters for regulation such as:

- Establishing OPP governance-related regulations, including the composition of OPP detachment boards and the OPP Governance Advisory Council;
- Developing an approach to determine when it is appropriate to have more than one OPP detachment board for a detachment of the OPP that provides policing to municipalities or First Nations;
- Aligning the existing OPP billing framework with the CSPA, 2019.

We recognize the significant implications these regulatory changes will have on communities that receive direct and/or supplemental services from the OPP.

Given these impacts, my ministry will engage communities through regional roundtable sessions. The regional roundtables will be an opportunity for the ministry to provide an overview of upcoming regulatory changes related to OPP services and for communities to identify pertinent local issues and provide feedback on OPP-related policy proposals.

Government announces consultation on re-composition of OPP Detachment Boards

On January 15th, the Honourable Sylvia Jones, Ontario's Solicitor General, wrote to Heads of Council to announce province-wide consultations on the drafting of regulations needed to support the establishment of new OPP detachment boards. These discussions will include changes to the billing framework allocating costs between municipalities with a shared OPP detachment board. AMO strongly encourages the participation of local elected officials in these discussions.

For municipalities, the goal of this engagement is a regulatory framework that supports successful and effective governance and delivers strong local civilian oversight of policing by the OPP. This should include mechanisms for every municipal council to be represented on an OPP detachment board and the equitable distribution of costs between municipalities.

The need for new OPP governance regulations is as a result of the new *Community Safety and Policing Act, 2019*. Key governance-related changes include:

Structure of Boards and Local Say

- There shall be one OPP detachment board per detachment (with flexibility for unique circumstances/geography). A board's composition, terms of office, and remuneration will be provided for in regulations and has yet to be determined.

- In effect, these changes extend police governance to about 200 municipalities (which do not have a board, ie. Section 5.1) but will consolidate multiple existing boards within a detachment.

Activity of Boards

- Boards shall determine local objectives, priorities, and policies in consultation with the Detachment Commander, consistent with the Solicitor General's strategic plan for the OPP.
- Boards shall consult with the Commissioner of the OPP regarding the selection of the Detachment Commander.
- The Detachment Commander shall prepare and adopt a local action plan in consultation with the board.
- Training for board members will become mandatory (Ministry support and funding is needed).

Financial Considerations

- There will be no distinction between contract and non-contract in the future. Effectively all policing will become contract.
- The focus of the billing related regulations will be to address transition matters and to account for service differences between municipalities as well as existing contracts expiring at the end of 2020.
- It should be noted, billing model changes will not lower the overall cost of policing for the municipal sector.

OPP Governance Advisory Council (Provincial)

- The establishment of this Council is to provide advice to the Solicitor General with respect to the use of the Solicitor General's powers related to the OPP.
- More generally, this change will enhance civilian governance of the OPP.

AMO Advocacy

AMO has impressed upon the Ministry of the need for:

- open and transparent discussions;
- a recognition that policing is fundamentally local (ie. it is important to maintain the close proximity of a community to its board and the police);
- locally workable governance arrangements; and
- the representation of every municipal council.

Key Municipal Considerations

For local elected officials participating in the government's consultation, here are some key considerations:

1. For communities without existing police service or detachment boards: boards are an opportunity to expand the democratic oversight and governance of policing. In the words of Sir Robert Peel, the father of modern policing, "the police are the public and the public are the police." A detachment board helps to align policing objectives, priorities, and policies with community expectations.
2. For communities with existing OPP boards: the legislation aims to consolidate existing municipal board boundaries with OPP detachment board boundaries (thus potentially including multiple neighbouring municipalities in the same detachment). However, the legislation provides for flexibility to address unique geographic circumstances. If you feel your area's needs are unique, help the Ministry understand that uniqueness in a province-wide context.
3. The size and composition of detachment boards have not been determined. This is your opportunity to inform the regulations which will determine board composition.
4. On the issue of policing costs, speak to your local circumstances. Highlight areas where your property taxpayers would benefit from greater transparency or illustrate steps that could be taken to improve the efficiency and effectiveness of policing in your community (ie. shift scheduling). This should include highlighting the need that all new policing regulations (governance and operations) should aim to improve the efficiency and effectiveness of policing and not drive policing costs even higher.
5. On the issue of OPP billing, note that billing changes alone will not lower the overall cost of policing by the OPP. The equitable distribution of costs across the detachment is a key goal of all municipalities.

The Solicitor General has advised that regional roundtable meetings will be taking place in Kenora, Thunder Bay, Sudbury, Timmins, London, Brockville, and Orillia. The Ministry will communicate the dates and times of these meetings shortly in separate correspondence.

In addition, the Ontario Association of Police Service Boards is convening an OPP Governance Summit on January 30, 2020 which will include a presentation by the Ministry.

AMO will continue to engage the Ministry in discussions related to OPP detachment boards and other regulations which affect policing (OPP and own-force) in all municipalities in the months ahead. Please feel free to relay any positions or concerns of sector-wide interest to AMO.

Purpose

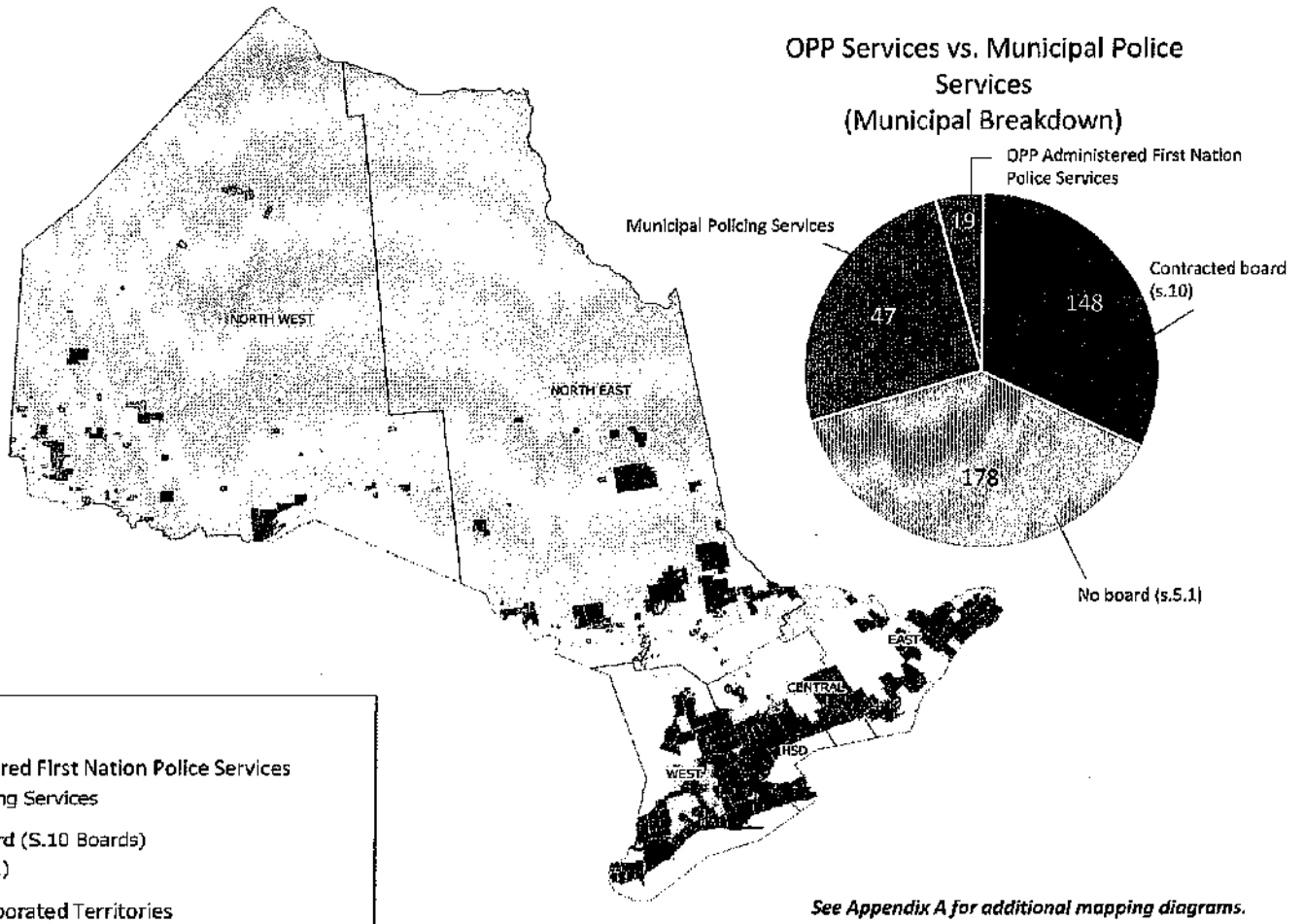
Context

- On March 26, 2019, Ontario passed the *Comprehensive Ontario Police Services Act, 2019* (Bill 68) and established the *Community Safety and Policing Act, 2019* (CSPA, 2019).
 - Once in-force, the CSPA, 2019 will replace the *Police Services Act* (1990).
- The CSPA, 2019 supports the government's commitment to:
 - Strengthen public confidence in policing and maintain key independent policing oversight functions;
 - Demonstrate respect for front line policing personnel by building the right supports and fair processes to enable police to effectively perform their duties and ensure public safety; and
 - Deliver quality and efficient policing while also realizing better value for money.

CSPA, 2019: Implementation Plan

- The ministry is targeting bringing the CSPA, 2019 into force in 2021.
- There are approximately **50 -70 matters for regulation** that will be developed to bring the CSPA, 2019 into force, including regulations related to the OPP.
- OPP related matters are under the following three thematic areas:
 - OPP Detachment Boards;
 - OPP Advisory Council; and
 - Transitioning from the section 10 framework under the PSA to the new OPP detachment framework under the CSPA, 2019.

Current Landscape: Policing Services Across Ontario

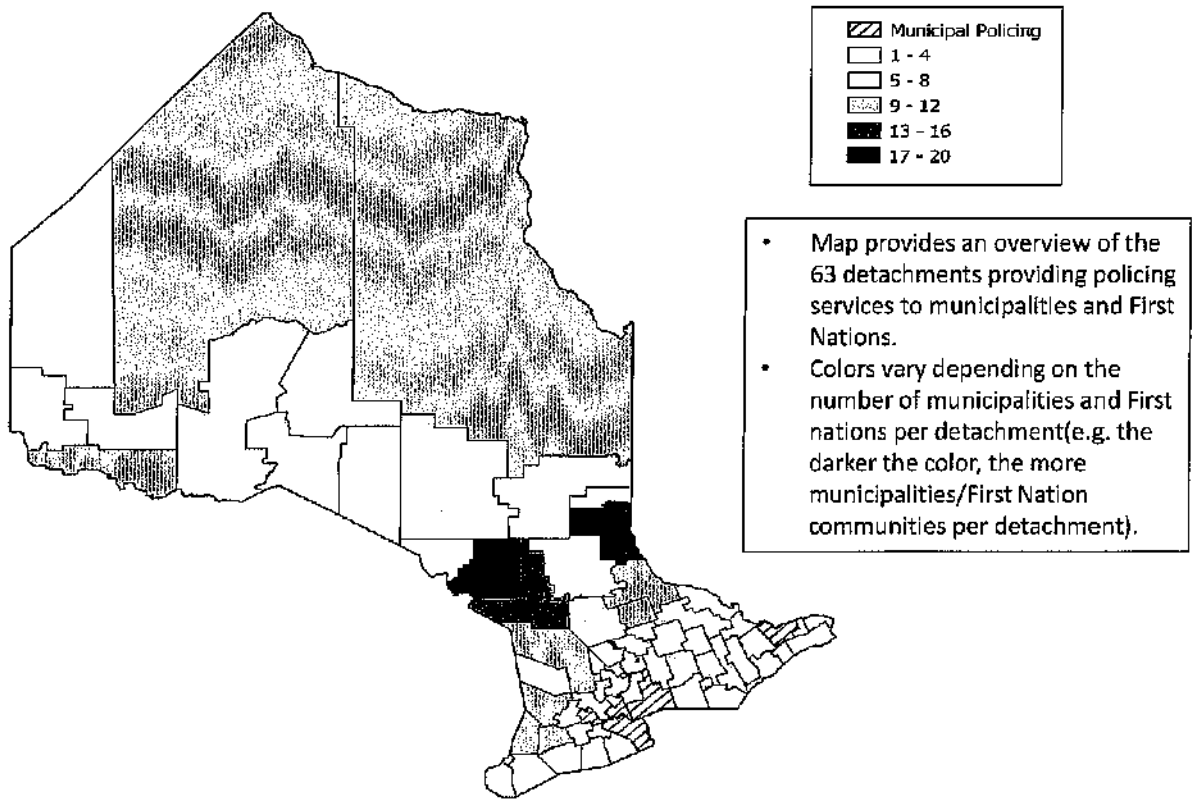

Current Landscape: OPP Services Across Ontario

- The OPP provides policing services through 63 OPP detachments across five OPP regions.
- Through the 63 detachments, the OPP provides policing support and services to:
 - 326 of the 443 municipalities across Ontario; and
 - 45 First Nation communities.
- Each detachment serves anywhere from 1 to 20 municipalities and/or First Nation communities (see Appendix A.1) through a “host” detachment. Some detachments may also have multiple “satellite” detachment locations.
 - A detachment host location is the main operational center for the detachment and the commander.
 - A satellite location is a smaller report location that has some of the host detachments functionality (e.g., cells, administrative support, property vault, etc.).

Current Landscape: OPP Policing Services Across Ontario by Detachment



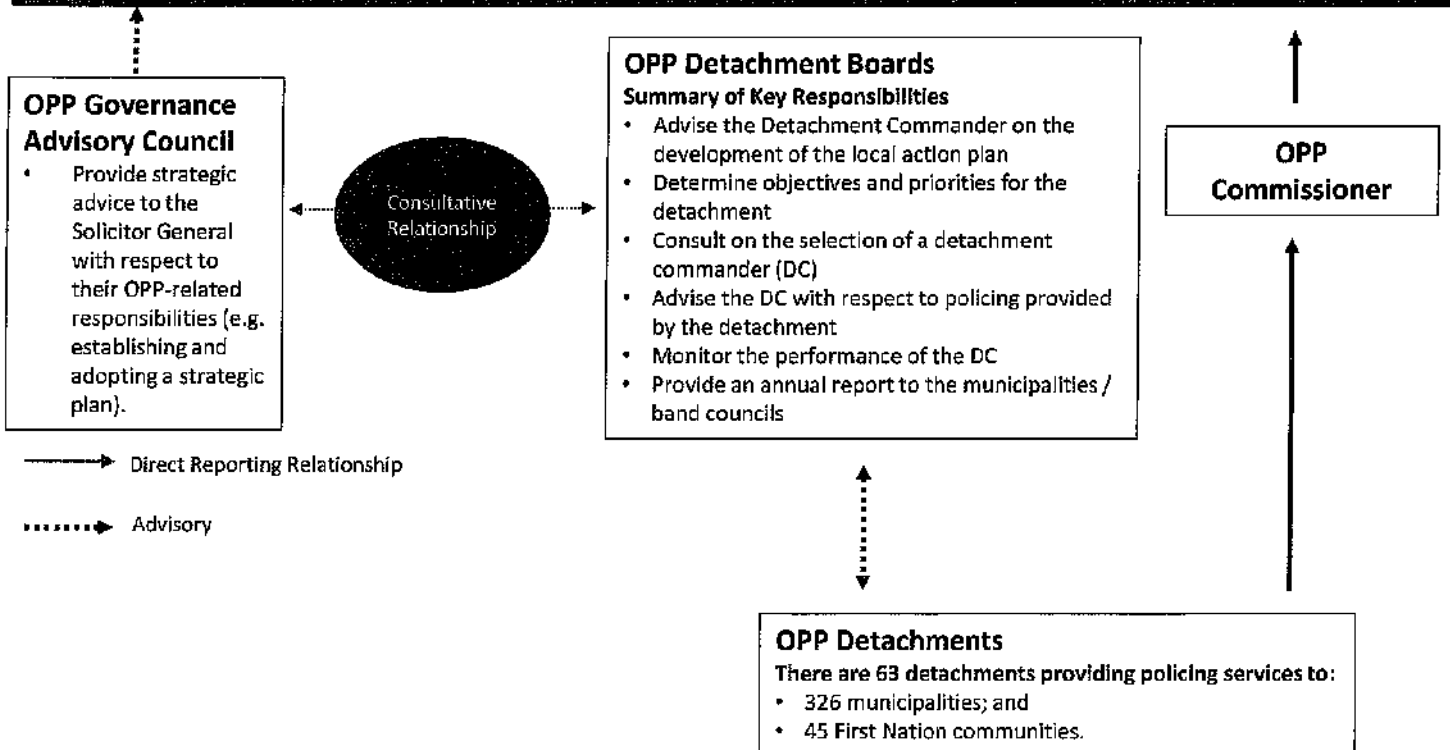

CSPA, 2019: OPP Governance Overview

Solicitor General

- Develop the Strategic Plan for the OPP, in accordance with requirements in the CSPA, 2019;
- Establish policies that ensure the Commissioner provides adequate and effective policing in accordance with the needs of the population in the areas for which the Commissioner has policing responsibility; and
- Monitor and review Commissioner's performance.



CSPA, 2019: Detachment Board Member Governance

RECRUITMENT AND APPOINTMENT

- The appointing person/body shall take into consideration:
 - the representation of the area the board serves, having regard for the diversity of the population;
 - the need for the board to have members with the prescribed competencies; and
 - results of a potential appointee's police record check that was prepared within the past 12 months.

TRAINING

- Detachment board members must successfully complete training on:
 - Role of detachment board and responsibilities of members of the board;
 - Human rights and systemic racism;
 - The diverse, multiracial and multicultural character of Ontario society;
 - The rights and cultures of First Nation, Inuit and Métis Peoples; and
 - Additional training as prescribed in regulation by the Solicitor General.

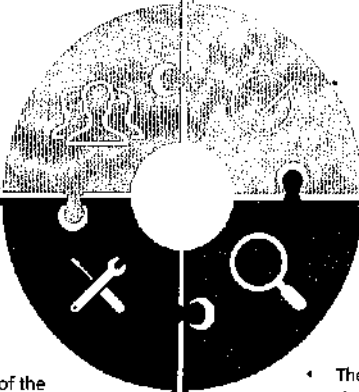
A detachment board member can not exercise the powers or perform the duties of their position until they have successfully completed the training on roles and responsibilities.

SUPPORTING TOOLS

- OPP detachment boards must:
 - advise the Detachment Commander on the development of the local action plan;
 - determine objectives and priorities for the detachment, not inconsistent with the strategic plan prepared by the Minister, after consultation with the detachment commander or his or her designate; and
 - consider any community safety and well-being plan adopted by a municipality or First Nation that receives policing from the detachment.
- The Code of Conduct will identify what behaviors detachment board members are prohibited from engaging in or required to perform.

COMPLIANCE AND ENFORCEMENT

- The CSPA, 2019 requires all detachment board members to comply with the Code of Conduct.
- The CSPA, 2019 establishes the role of the IG to monitor, inspect, and ensure compliance with the act.
 - It also empowers the IG to monitor and conduct inspections of members of a OPP detachment board to ensure they do not commit misconduct.
- The IG will be able to impose remedies for detachment board members' misconduct and non-compliance under the CSPA, 2019.

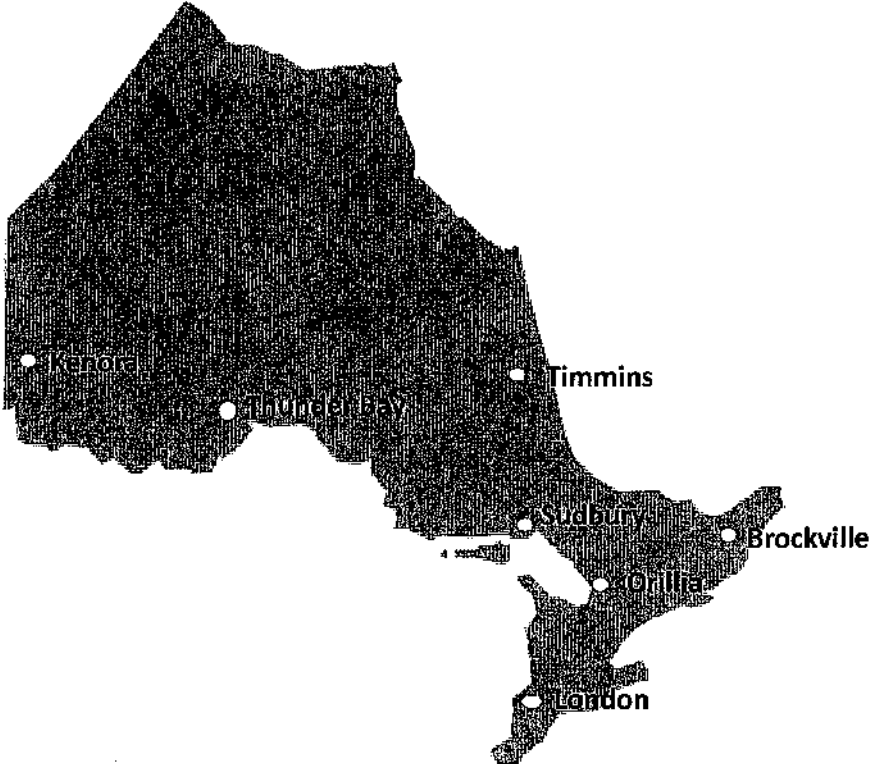

CSPA, 2019: Principles of the OPP Framework

1. Support and enhance local civilian governance by ensuring municipalities and First Nation communities receiving policing services from the OPP have an opportunity to represent their local perspectives, needs, and priorities;
2. Provide opportunities for municipalities and First Nations to collaborate on efforts to enhance community safety;
3. Enable OPP services to be delivered in a transparent, coordinated and more efficient manner.

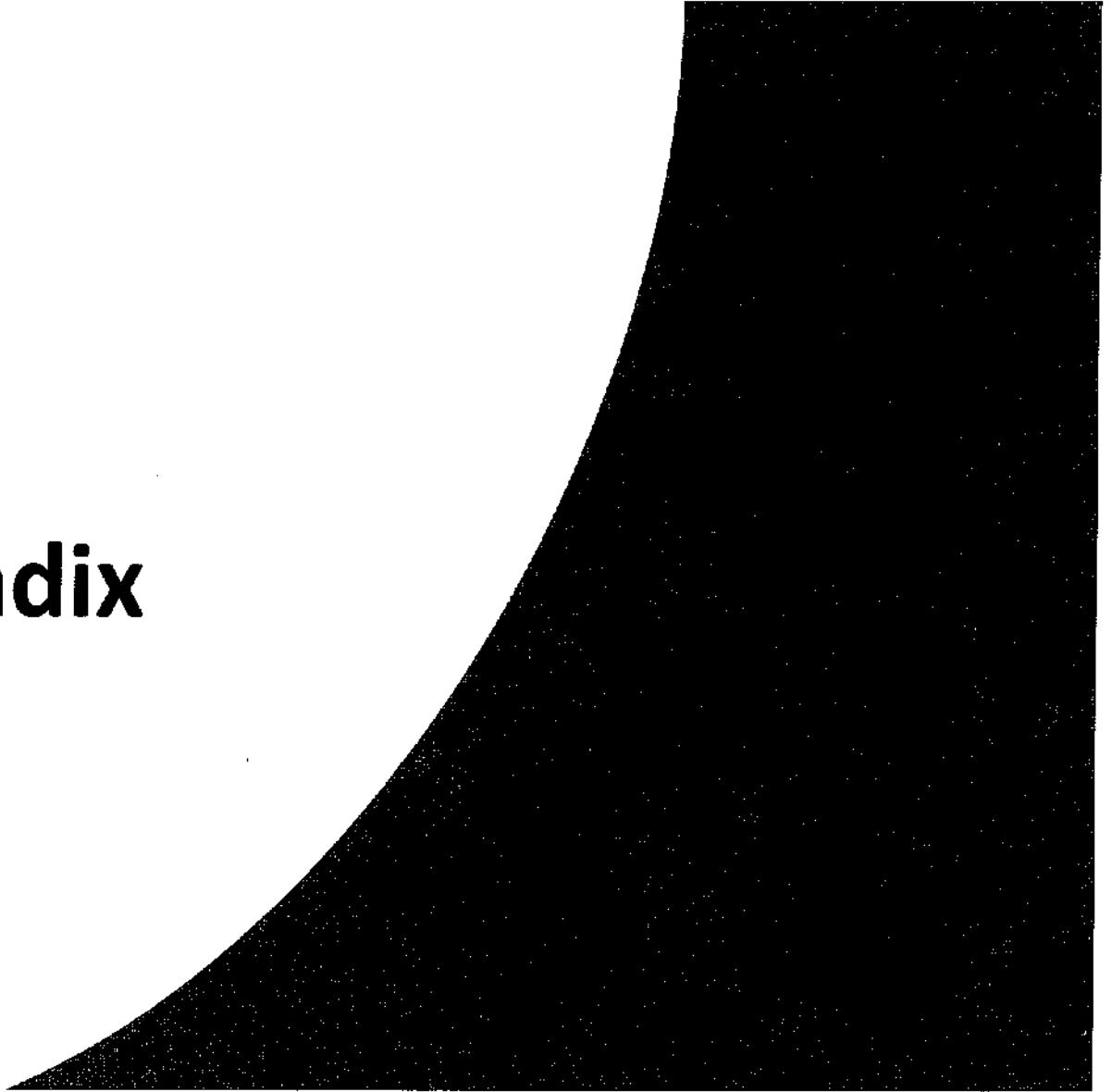

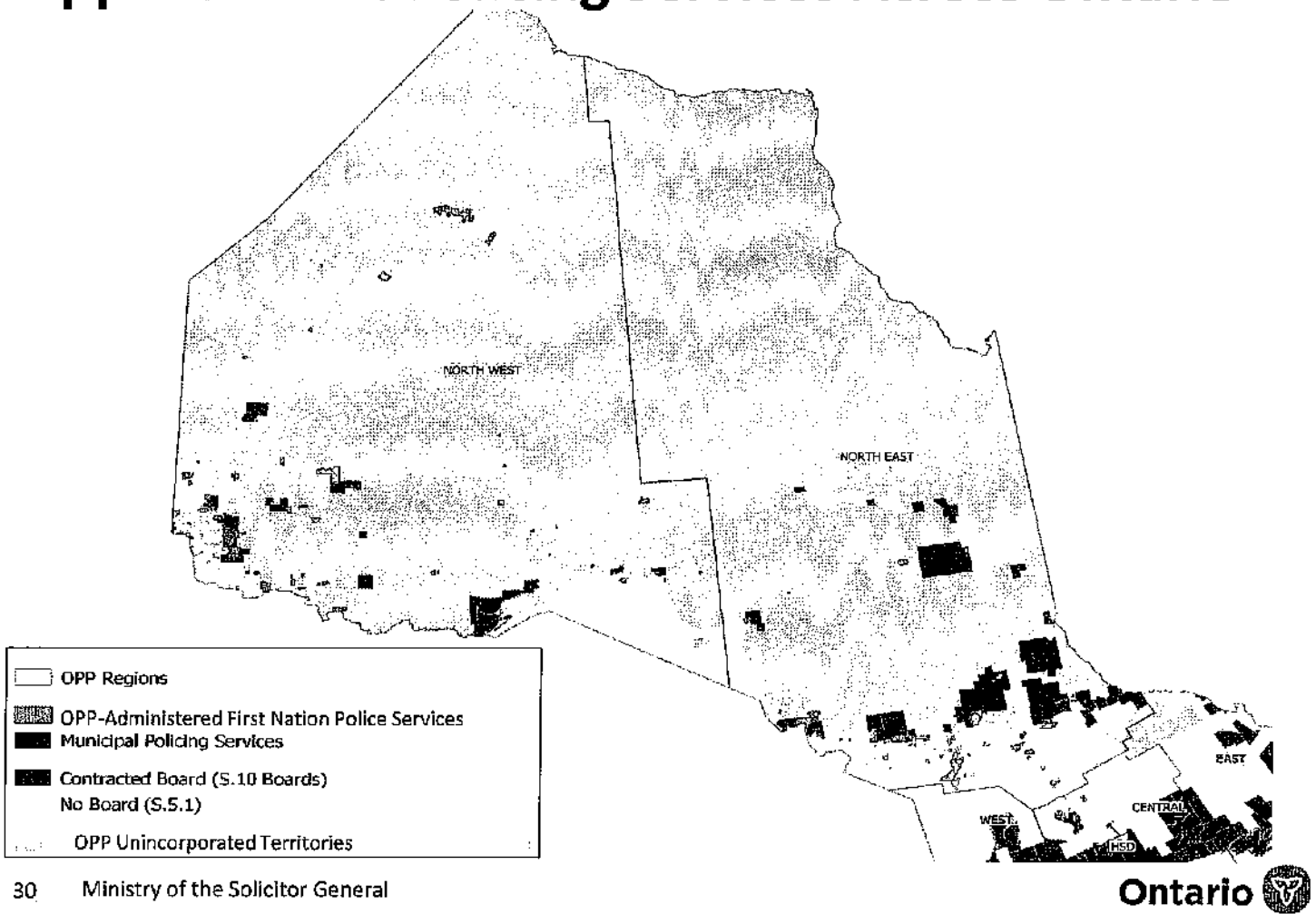

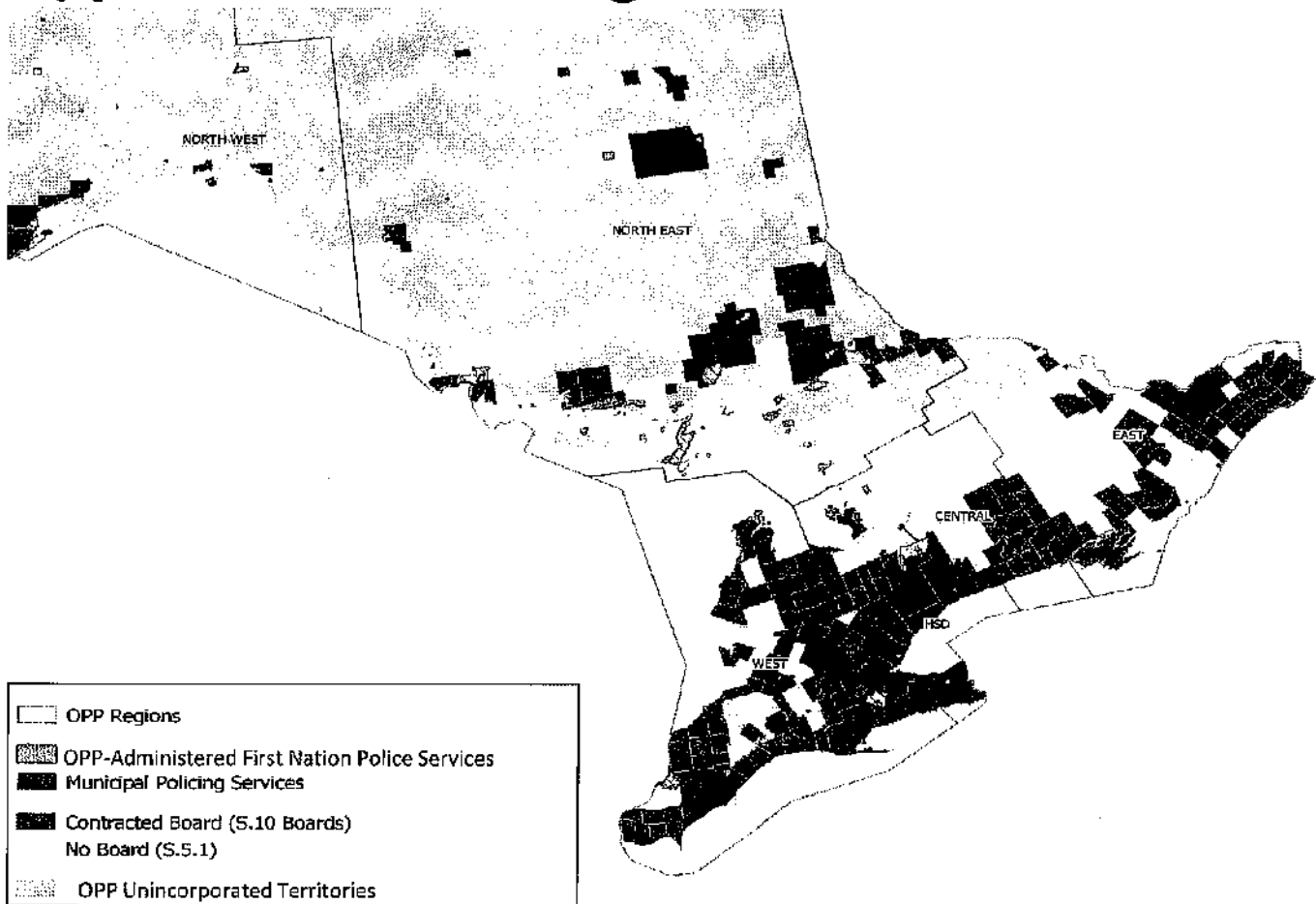

Ladies and Gentlemen, by way of update. i will now share a response just received from Mathew Wilson, AMO Senior Advisor. These comments follow an inquiry I requested our Tay valley Township Clerk to make with regard to the impact the COVID-19 virus was having on the implementation dates for both the Well-Being Plan and new Police Act This then is Mr. Wilson's reply.

" The Government has taken steps to defer the completion of mandatory Municipal Community Safety and Well-Being Planning from January 1st. 2021 to an unspecified date in the future. Consultations on other. Regulations needed to support the new Police Act have ceased. Whether or not those Regulations are still doable for the Spring of 2021 remains up in the air and will depend on the duration of the emergency. We anticipate any revisions to the timelines which the Government may make will be mindful of stakeholders input/capacity and the need for successful implementation.."

As more information becomes available and the timelines for .implementation also becomes known your Zone 2 Executive working in cooperation with the OAPSB and Ministry of Sol./Gen. Policing Advisor will keep you informed.

The following message is sent on behalf of Neil Fennell, Chair of the OAPSB Zone 2. Please forward to your respective Police Services Boards / Community Policing Advisory Committee members? Thank you

My fellow Zone 2 members I do hope this note finds you and your family safe and well. I don't have to tell you the COVID-19 pandemic is the most challenging event in our lifetime. It has impacted so much of our lives and remains difficult to fully comprehend even now. We are not out of the woods yet and until a proven vaccine or therapy can be found and distributed we must be deliberate in our effort to return to the "new normal", whatever that is. I have been in discussion with the Zone Executive, several member Boards and others discussing a way forward for the Zone to ensure it remains relevant to the membership. What follows now is a model covering Zone 2 meeting schedule, 2020 through 2022. Also, thoughts on maintaining contact between Police Governance resources and Zone members to ensure lines of communication remain open.

As for Zone 2 meeting schedule moving forward.

2020 - all scheduled meetings are cancelled through the balance of the year. Both Deep River and Ottawa agreed that too much uncertainty surrounds the pandemic and we should err on the caution. I thank each Board for their understanding.

2021 - We will meet twice in the year. 1st. Mid June - host Ottawa PSB. The 2nd. in mid September will be hosted by Prince Edward County PSB.

NOTE: For now future Zone 2 meetings will be 1 day gatherings. I think it prudent to forgo Thursday evening get togethers until such time that this pandemic is behind us.

2022 - I anticipate a return to 3 meetings format. I have begun to identify potential sites. I must applaud those Boards who are considering a host opportunity for their unqualified support.

Before I go further I should state clearly that what we are proposing must meet with the approval of a majority of member Boards and with input from the OAPSB. I don't have a crystal ball but my overriding concern is public safety.

Now, given that I'm proposing extended periods of time without person to person contact we must seek ways to stay in touch. With that in mind I suggest the following:

1. For my part I will remain in touch through periodic updates and simply inquiring after your health and welfare.

2. I have reached to our Ministry of the Sol/Gen. Policing Adviser Graham Wight to encourage him to provide Ministry updates and even followup after Ministry releases to summarize the content and respond to inquiries from members.

Also, he mentioned he would be willing to undertake Board training by way of a "virtual" meeting. If your Board wishes to undertake training please reach out to Graham. You can reach him <Graham.Wight@ontario.ca>

NOTE; Graham will be on leave from May 17th until September 15th 2020. In his absence David Tilley will fill in.

3. I reached out to our Zone 2 Director King Yee (Brockville PSB) urging him to share information that he might acquire from OAPSB meetings he attends. Remember please if you have questions or concerns relative to the OAPSB King Yee is the Zone's eyes and ears inside the OAPSB. Seek his assistance as needed.

4. One important function of our annual meetings is to allow for an exchange of ideas among members. Perhaps a Board has an initiative worth sharing with the rest of us. I encourage Boards to send off descriptions of a local group or project that is working in your community to our Zone Secretary /Treasurer Diane Smithson and she in turn will pass on the detail to Zone members. We can all learn from each others experiences.

Zone 2/3 Section 10 Boards representative on the OAPSB. I do hope the membership, particularly Section 10 Boards across the Zone , who by the way make up a majority of Zone member Boards, realize that the election of our Zone 2/3 rep. takes place Thursday afternoon. So that you understand one representative for Section 10 Boards in Zone's 2 and 3. one only. I trust you have received the notice from the OAPSB. Two candidates stand for election. One gentleman, Don BESSO is a member of the Hamilton Twp. PSB. I don't know him but I'am sure he has some fine qualities. The second candidate I know quite well, Jim Harrison, Quinte West Mayor and Chair of the PSB. Jim speaks his mind and isn't shy about sharing his opinion. Having said that he brings a wealth of experience to the role of Police Governance. If he is elected it will be the first time in a while that the Zone 2/3 representative for Section 10 Boards comes from a Zone 2 Board. We cannot go wrong with Jim Harrison.

There that's enough on the Political front. Please take time to read through this rather drawn out description of what I believe lay ahead for our Zone. Comments and suggestions welcome.

Re: Recent Protest Activity

The unjustified and criminal acts that led to the death of Mr. George Floyd have caused the public to question its trust and confidence in our profession. There are members within the Ontario Provincial Police (OPP) and the communities we provide policing services to who are hurting, and feeling frustrated and outraged. It is important for us as an organization to have the courage to openly discuss these types of incidents in a respectful, compassionate and professional manner. It has become clear that in order to maintain the trust and confidence of our communities, and in support of our members, we must not only speak out against racist behaviour, but listen to what Ontarians are telling us and ensure that our actions align with our words by exemplifying our values of interacting with respect, compassion and fairness – something I believe our members do every day.

Over the course of the last few days, we have witnessed anti-racism demonstrations expanding from urban centres to jurisdictions policed by the OPP, and we are reminded of our responsibility and duty to respect the right of everyone to freedom of expression and peaceful assembly. Our role is to ensure public safety and to keep the peace. In many of these instances, the OPP Provincial Liaison Team will work with groups to provide a safe and peaceful opportunity for demonstrators to exercise their constitutional rights.

This is a unique time in which the rights of freedom of expression and movement must be considered against the current public health recommendations of physical distancing and the emergency orders in the province. Our primary duty is to preserve the peace, maintain public safety and investigate unlawful activity. Members should use their discretion and judgement to consider all circumstances and balance it against the rights of the public to peacefully demonstrate.

The North Grenville Police Services Board Rules & Procedures

WHEREAS the Municipality of North Grenville is required pursuant to Section 4(1) of the *Police Services Act* to provide adequate and effective police service in accordance with its needs;

AND WHEREAS the Municipality of North Grenville has entered into a contract with the Ministry of Community Safety and Correctional Services pursuant to Section 10(1) of the *Police Services Act* for the provision of police services for the municipality by the Ontario Provincial Police;

AND WHEREAS the municipality is required pursuant to Section 10(2) of the *Police Services Act* to have a Police Services Board;

AND WHEREAS the Police Services Board is required pursuant to Section 37 of the *Police Services Act* to establish its own rules and procedures in performing its duties under the Act

NOW THEREFORE The North Grenville Police Services Board enacts the following Rules and Procedures:

1. DEFINITIONS

- (a) "Act" means the *Police Services Act*, R.S.O. 1990, c.P.15;
- (b) "Board" means the North Grenville Police Services Board;
- (c) "Chair" means the Chair of the Board;
- (d) "Detachment Commander" means the member of the Ontario Provincial Police assigned as Detachment Commander reporting to the North Grenville Police Services Board either permanently or in an acting capacity;
- (e) "Council" means the Council of the Municipality of North Grenville;
- (f) "Days" means calendar days exclusive of Saturdays, Sundays, and Statutory holidays;
- (g) "Family member" means the parent, spouse or child of the person, as those terms are defined in Section 1 of the *Municipal Conflict of Interest Act*;
- (h) "Member" means a member of the North Grenville Police Services Board;

- (i) "Police Service" means policing provided under contract by the Ontario Provincial Police to the Municipality of North Grenville;
- (j) "Quorum" means a majority of the Members of the Board in accordance with Section 35(2) of the Act;
- (k) "Secretary" means the secretary of the North Grenville Police Services Board;

2. APPLICATION

- 2.1 The rules and procedures contained herein shall be observed in all proceedings of the Board and shall be the rules for the order and dispatch of business before the Board and with necessary modifications in a committee of the Board.

The Chair shall decide all points of order or procedure for which rules have not been provided for.

3. BOARD COMPOSITION

- 3.1 In accordance with Section 27(4) of the Act shall consist of:
- (a) one member of municipal council and the head of municipal council (if the head chooses not to be a member of the board, another member of the council) appointed by resolution of the council;
 - (b) one person of the municipality, who is neither a member of the council nor an employee of the municipality, appointed by resolution of the council; and
 - (c) two persons appointed by the Lieutenant Governor of the Province of Ontario.

4. DUTIES AND RESPONSIBILITIES OF THE BOARD

The Board shall be responsible for those duties as set out in Section 10 of the *Police Services Act* and Sections 30 and 32 of the *Adequacy and Effectiveness of Police Services Regulation*.

5. DUTIES AND RESPONSIBILITIES OF THE CHAIR

It shall be the duty and responsibility of the Chair to:

- (a) ensure that the activities of the Board and of the O.P.P. are reported to Council as

required;

- (b) act as the spokesperson for the policy decisions of the Board;
- (c) set the agenda for all Board meetings;
- (d) open meetings of the Board by taking the chair and calling the Members to order;
- (e) receive and submit all motions presented by the Members;
- (f) put to vote all resolutions presented by the Members and announce the results;
- (g) decline to put to vote all motions, which infringe upon the rules and procedures or are beyond the jurisdiction of the Board;
- (h) enforce the observance of order and decorum at all meetings;
- (i) adjourn the meeting;
- (j) if deemed necessary adjourn, suspend, or recess the meeting;
- (k) sign all documents for and on behalf of the Board including but not limited to:
 - Resolutions;
 - Agreements; and
 - Protocols,which the Board has approved;
- (l) perform any other additional duties when directed to do so by motion of the Board.

6. DUTIES OF THE VICE CHAIR

In the event that the Chair is absent or vacant, the Vice Chair shall act in place of the Chair and shall have the same authority, rights, and powers of the Chair.

7. SELECTION OF CHAIR AND VICE CHAIR

- 7.1 In accordance with Section 28(1) and (2) of the Act, the members of the Board shall, at the first meeting held in January of each year, select from amongst its members, a chair and vice chair for a term of one year.
- 7.2 The election of the Chair shall be conducted by the Secretary;
- 7.3 The election of the Vice Chair shall be conducted by the Chair;

- 7.4 Any votes required under this section shall be taken as described by the provision of Section 61(1) and (2) of the *Municipal Act*, R.S.O. which requires that each member of the Board present shall indicate his or her vote openly, and that no vote be taken by ballot or any other method of secret balloting.

8. COMMITTEES OF THE BOARD

8.1 The Board may at any time appoint one or more Members to a Committee of the Board to inquire into any matter within the jurisdiction of the Board.

8.2 The Committee shall report upon its work to the Board at the meeting of the Board immediately following the date of the Committee meeting or at a specified time agreed to by the Board.

8.3 **If the Board is facing challenges arranging for all members to participate in decision-making it may choose to delegate any authority confirmed on it within the Police Service Act to two or more of its members**

9. REGULAR MEETINGS OF THE BOARD

9.1 The Board shall hold monthly regular meetings (with the exception of July and August) at such place and time as may be determined by the Board.

9.2 The Chair (or designate) shall preside at all meetings.

9.3 The Chair may cancel a regular meeting of the Board where he/she deems such meeting not warranted however such cancellation shall not permit the Board to hold less than four regular meetings each year.

9.4 The Chair may call a virtual regular meeting under the following conditions:

- 1. a majority of the Board deems this to be appropriate**
- 2. the virtual meeting can be made open to the public and media.**

9.5 Notification to the public of a virtual meeting will be deemed

complete with notification to the print media or other means determined by the Board 2 days in advance of the meeting.

10. SPECIAL MEETINGS OF THE BOARD

- 10.1 The Chair may at any time summon a special meeting of the Board or shall do so whenever requested by the majority of the Board.
- 10.2 The Secretary shall give notice to all Members of such special meetings by whatever means deemed expedient by the Secretary.
- 10.3 No special meeting of the Board shall be held with less than 24 hours notice to the Members.
- 10.4 Notification to the public of a special meeting will be deemed complete with notification to the print media or other means as determined by the Board 24 hours in advance of the meeting.
- 10.6A meeting deemed to be Closed, will not require public notification.
- 10.6 No business may be transacted at a special meeting other than that specified in the notice or agenda.
- 10.7 **The Chair may call a virtual special meeting subject to section 9.4 and 9.5 and members are provided no less than 24 hours notice of the meeting**

11. THE CALLING OF THE MEETING TO ORDER

- 11.1 The Chair shall call the meeting to order as soon as possible after the time announced for the commencement of the meeting and a quorum is present.
- 11.2 If a quorum for either a regular or special meeting of the Board is not present within 15 minutes of the time fixed for the commencement of the meeting, the Secretary shall indicate that no quorum was present and the meeting shall stand adjourned until the next regular meeting or such time as determined by the Chair.

12. BOARD AGENDA

12.1 The Secretary shall cause an agenda to be prepared for the use of the Members at the regular meetings of the Board in the following order:

- Disclosure of Interest
- Approval of the Minutes of the Previous Meeting
- Presentations/Delegations
- Reports
 - O.P.P.
 - Chairperson
 - Members
 - Treasurer
- General Business/Decision Items
- Correspondence
- Other Business
- Date of Next Meeting
- Adjournment

12.2 The Secretary shall receive all reports and supporting materials for the agenda at least 2 days prior to the regular Board Meeting and shall consult with the Chair prior to the completion of the agenda. An item that is not included in the agenda may not be introduced at the meeting without the consent of a majority of the Members present.

12.3 The Secretary shall receive every letter, petition and other communication addressed to the Board and shall:

- (a) If in the opinion of the Secretary the subject matter is properly within the jurisdiction of the Board, place it upon the agenda to be dealt with; or
- (b) If in the opinion of the Secretary, and confirmed by the Chair, the subject matter is properly within the jurisdiction of the O.P.P. Detachment Commander, shall refer the matter to him or her for necessary action and subsequent report to the Board.

12.4 The Secretary shall provide the agenda for each regular meeting to each Member of the Board not less than two days prior to the meeting.

13. CONDUCT OF MEMBERS

- (a) Board members shall attend and actively participate in all board meetings.
- (b) Board members shall not interfere with the police force's operational decisions and responsibilities or with the day-to-day operation of the police force, including the recruitment and promotion of police officers.

- (c) Board members shall undergo any training that may be provided or required for them by the Solicitor General.
- (d) Board members shall keep confidential any information disclosed or discussed at a meeting of the Board, or part of a meeting of the Board, that was closed to the public.
- (e) No Board Member shall speak on behalf of the Board unless he or she is authorized by the Board to do so.
- (f) A Board Member who expresses disagreement with a decision of the Board shall make it clear that he or she is expressing a personal opinion.
- (g) Board Members shall discharge their duties loyally, faithfully, impartially and according to the Act, any other Act and any regulation, rule or by-law, as provided in their oath or affirmation of office.
- (h) Board Members shall uphold the letter and spirit of this Code of Conduct and shall discharge their duties in a manner that will inspire public confidence in the abilities and integrity of the Board.
- (i) Board Members shall discharge their duties in a manner that respects the dignity of individuals and in accordance with the *Human Rights Code* and the *Charter of Rights and Freedoms* (Canada).
- (j) Board Members shall not use their office to advance their interests or the interests of any person or organization with whom or with which they are associated.
- (k) Board Members shall not use their office to obtain employment with the Board or the police force for themselves, their family member, or their same-sex partner.
- (l) A Board member, who applies for employment with the police force, including employment on contract or on fee for service, shall immediately resign from the Board.
- (m) Board members shall refrain from engaging in conduct that would discredit or compromise the integrity of the Board or the police force.
- (n) A Board member whose conduct or performance is being investigated or inquired into by the Ontario Civilian Commission On Police Services (OCCPS) under Section 25 of the Act or is the subject of a hearing before the Commission under that section shall decline to exercise his or her duties as a member of the Board for the duration of the investigation or inquiry and hearing.

- (o) If the Board determines that a Board member has breached the Code of Conduct set out in this Regulation, the Board shall record that determination in its minutes and may,
- I. require the member to appear before the Board and be reprimanded;
 - II. request that the Ministry of the Solicitor General conduct an investigation into the member's conduct; or
 - III. request that the Commission conduct an investigation into the member's conduct under Section 25 of the Act.

14. CONFLICT OF INTEREST

14.1 Where a Member, either on his or her own behalf or while acting for another, has any pecuniary interest, either direct or indirect, in any matter which is the subject of consideration at a meeting of the Board shall:

- (a) prior to any consideration of the matter at the meeting, disclose the conflict of interest and general nature thereof;
- (b) not take part in any discussion of, or vote on any question in respect of the matter; and
- (c) not attempt in any way to influence the voting on any such matter either before, during or after the meeting;
- (d) forthwith leave the meeting for that part of the meeting during which the matter is under consideration.

14.2 Where the conflict of interest has not been disclosed by reason of the Member's absence from the meeting, the Member shall disclose his or her interest and otherwise comply at the first meeting of the Board immediately following the meeting in which the matter was considered.

14.3 The Secretary shall record the particulars of any disclosure of interest in the minutes of the meeting.

15. HEARING OF DELEGATIONS

15.1 Delegations will only be heard at regular meetings of the Board provided that the person(s) representing the delegation has provided at least 4 days written notice of the request.

15.2 A request for a delegation shall include a list of the person(s) who will be appearing

before the Board and information as to the content of the presentation.

- 15.3 Unless approved by the Chair, delegations shall be restricted to presentations of no more than 10 minutes.
- 15.4 Upon receipt of the written notice, the Secretary shall list the delegation on the appropriate meeting agenda.
- 15.5 The Chair may curtail any delegation, any questions, or debate during a delegation for disorder or any other breach of this policy and, where the Chair rules that the delegation is concluded, the person(s) appearing shall immediately withdraw.

16. RULES OF DEBATE

- 16.1 Every Member, before speaking to a question or motion, shall first receive recognition from the Chair.
- 16.2 When a Member wishes to speak on any question, motion, or item, they shall in an orderly manner obtain the Chair's attention and the Chair shall keep a list of those Members who wish to speak. The Chair then shall recognize the Members in the order in which they came to the Chair's attention.
- 16.3 When a Member is speaking, no other Member shall pass information between any Member or the Chair, or interrupt that Member except to raise a point of order.
- 16.4 No Member shall speak to the same question or motion for more than 5 minutes, without leave of the Chair.
- 16.5 After a question is put by the Chair, no Member shall speak to the question, nor shall any other motion be put forward until after the vote has been taken and the results declared.
- 16.6 If a Member considers that a ruling by the Chair is not in order, an appeal may be made. In the event of an appeal, the Chair may give a brief explanation of the ruling and ask the Members "Is the ruling of the Chair upheld?" In the event of a tie vote, the ruling is upheld. The decision of the Board under this Section is final.

17. MOTIONS

- 17.1 All motions shall be duly moved and seconded before being discussed or put to a vote.
- 17.2 The Chair shall read a motion before a vote is taken.

- 17.3 After a motion has been moved, the mover may withdraw it at any time prior to a vote being taken.
- 17.4 A motion properly before the Board for decision must receive disposition before any other motion can be received, except motions to:
- (a) amend;
 - (b) refer;
 - (c) suspend the rules of procedure;
 - (d) vote on the question.
- 17.5 A motion to amend shall:
- (a) be relevant to the question to be decided;
 - (b) not be received if it in essence constitutes a rejection of the main question.
- 17.6 A motion to refer the question shall include:
- (a) the name of the Committee or other body or official to whom the question is referred; and
 - (b) the terms upon which the question is to be referred.
- 17.7 Debate upon a motion to refer shall only be permitted on the desirability of referring the question and the terms of the referral, and no discussion of the main question or an amendment thereto shall be permitted until dealt with.
- 17.8 No question shall be considered more than once at a meeting of the Board.
- 17.9 **Motions shall not be required to be made in writing during a virtual meeting.**

18. VOTING ON MOTIONS

- 18.1 A motion shall be deemed to be carried when a majority of the Members present and voting have expressed their agreement.
- 18.2 When, in the opinion of the Chair or upon the request of a Member, a question contains distinct proposals, the Chair may divide the question, and the vote upon each proposal shall be taken separately.
- 18.3 Every Member present at a meeting of the Board when a question is put forward shall vote unless prohibited by statute, and the Secretary shall record the name of the Member and the reason for prohibition. Any failure to vote by a member who is not disqualified shall be deemed to be a negative vote.

- 18.4 A recorded vote may be requested by a member immediately prior or immediately subsequent to the taking of a vote. The Secretary shall conduct the vote in alphabetical order by last name, followed by the Chair. The Secretary will advise the Chair of the count of the vote who in turn will announce the results.
- 18.5 Where on any question there is a tie vote, the motion shall be deemed to have been lost.
- 18.6 **All votes shall be recorded during an virtual meeting. Each member present, including the presiding officer, except a member who is disqualified from voting by any Act, shall announce his/her vote verbally when called in alphabetical order by the secretary and the secretary shall record each member's name and vote.**

19. PUBLIC AND CLOSED SESSION MEETINGS

- 19.1 Meetings and hearings conducted by the Board shall be open to the public, subject to Subsection (2), and notice of them shall be published in the manner that the Board determines.
- 19.2 The Board may exclude the public from all or part of a meeting or hearing if it is the opinion that;
- (a) matters involving public security may be disclosed and, having regard to the circumstances, the desirability of avoiding their disclosure in the public interest outweighs the desirability of adhering to the principle that proceedings be open to the public; or
 - (b) intimate financial or personal matters or other matters may be disclosed of such a nature, having regard to the circumstances, that the desirability of avoiding their disclosure in the interest of any person affected or in the public interest outweighs the desirability of adhering to the principle that proceedings be open to the public.
- 19.3 No person other than the Members, Secretary, Detachment Commander, and other persons invited by the Chair shall attend closed session meetings of the Board.

I am writing further to several inquiries we have received in relation to challenges with hosting police services board meetings due to the impact of COVID-19 on in-person activities.

The *Police Services Act* (PSA) outlines the duties of police services boards with respect to board meetings, while requiring that each board establish its own rules and procedures in performing its duties under the Act. While the Act requires that boards meet at least four times a year, it is quite common across the province for boards to meet more frequently, often on a monthly basis in order to fulfill their duties.

While this is ultimately a local decision, the ministry is taking this opportunity to provide clarification that may support boards in continuing to meet via alternative methods in absence of the ability to meet in-person. Notably, the PSA does not require that police services board meetings be held in-person. While police services board meetings are to be open to the public, there is flexibility for public meetings to be held virtually if a board deems this to be appropriate and if the virtual meeting can be made open to the public. With respect to board meetings conducted virtually, police services boards should take all feasible measures to facilitate public and media participation in open meetings.

Of note, there are specific circumstances that allow for issues to be discussed in-camera and these circumstances remain in-force during the emergency. A board may exclude the public from all or part of a meeting if it is of the opinion that:

- a) matters involving public security may be disclosed and, having regard to the circumstances, the desirability of avoiding their disclosure in the public interest outweighs the desirability of adhering to the principle that proceedings be open to the public; or
- b) intimate financial or personal matters or other matters may be disclosed of such a nature, having regard to the circumstances, that the desirability of avoiding their disclosure in the interest of any person affected or in the public interest outweighs the desirability of adhering to the principle that proceedings be open to the public.

Further, a board may choose to delegate any authority conferred on it within the PSA to two or more of its members (or one member in the case of collective bargaining). Boards are encouraged to consider reviewing their rules and procedures, taking into account the ability to delegate, should it be facing challenges in arranging for all members to participate in decision-making at this time.

As a friendly reminder, should police services boards have questions regarding their obligations with respect to meetings, or any of their duties under the Act, during this time, I would encourage you to work with your Police Services Advisor. Should you require legal advice, please ensure to reach out to your legal counsel.

Re: Change in security check and revenue distribution processes

The Ontario Provincial Police (OPP) is doing our part to help reduce the risk of spreading COVID-19 by restricting access to detachments across the province. We have already taken the step of limiting the processing of routine security checks (criminal record checks/vulnerable sector checks) by detachment staff. We are committed to processing security checks deemed to be necessary, or for emergency circumstances, and mitigating any potential COVID-19 related health risks, as much as possible.

In late April 2020, the OPP adopted a new procedure for processing emergent security checks that reduces the risk to applicants and improves on the efficiency of the process by:

- Moving the security check application form to an online submission, reducing applicants' detachment visits to one visit in most circumstances; a visit to pick up the completed security check.
- Centralizing the vetting of applications for emergent needs and oversight of the process.
- Providing applicants access to a paperless payment method to a provincial Point of Sale terminal over the phone, further reducing the risk of potential exposure to a COVID-19 transmission vector.


Under the new process, applicants will make their payment over the telephone to detachments that currently have provincial Point of Sale machines. The funds will be deposited directly to the Consolidated Revenue Fund (CRF) of the provincial government in accordance with the Financial Administration Act, RSO 1990. Security check revenue is tracked to ensure these funds are allocated to the municipality where applicants reside.

Revenue will be credited back to municipal policing accounts quarterly throughout the year. The credit will be provided to municipalities approximately two months after the end of the quarter (May, August, November, and February). The credit process for 2020 is impacted by the in-year implementation of the new process and details on the timing of the credit will be provided to municipalities in future correspondence.

All revenue collected by OPP detachments for security checks, finger prints and reports provided to the public for a fee will follow this process to ensure compliance with the FAA.

Police boards respond to officer shortage

Questions raised over OPP billing practices

An increasing number of municipalities are wondering what exactly they are getting for the millions they pay each year for OPP policing.

Staffing shortages have become chronic to the point where police boards are asking whether they are paying for services they aren't receiving.

Locally, Norfolk OPP are short nine front-line officers while Haldimand OPP is staffed at 60 percent. The Haldimand detachment relies on Norfolk officers in emergencies in what the provincial force calls a "borderless policing" strategy.

"The OPP is pocketing money from municipalities but not delivering services," says Dennis Travale, chair of the Norfolk Police Services Board. "This has been going on for a while."

A total of 150 municipalities have contracts with the OPP. Pending retirements at the management level promise to complicate staffing shortages in the field.

At its annual general meeting in May, the Ontario Association of Police Services Boards (OAPSB) passed a resolution asking the OPP's Municipal Policing Bureau to provide an explanation of its staffing practices along with an accounting of how much it collects for officers that are not in the field or on the payroll.

OAPSB also wants a dialogue with the Ministry of the Solicitor-General, the agency at Queen's Park responsible for policing matters in Ontario.

Travale says the OPP in West Region, which is based in London, is short 100 officers. With each front-line constable costing about \$150,000 a year, Travale said that's \$15 million worth of policing municipalities are not receiving. As a conservative estimate, Travale said the total value of undelivered policing services in OPP jurisdictions across Ontario could be as high as \$45 million a year.

"You're collecting money from municipalities and it's going into your coffers," Travale said. "What are you doing with it? Are we going to get a rebate at the end of the year?"

Dunnville Coun. Bernie Corbett, chair of the Haldimand PSB, says front-line shortages in Haldimand have been chronic for years. In recent months, the problem has been acute. Were it not for Norfolk officers backfilling in crisis situations, Corbett says Haldimand couldn't respond in a timely manner in some cases.

Both Travale and Corbett report OPP brass are unmoved by the complaints. PSBs are told the standard is "adequate and effective policing," and that so long as the OPP is delivering that the provincial force is holding up its end of the bargain.

For their part, police boards find this metric inadequate.

"That's like trying to nail Jell-o to the wall," Corbett says.

The Haldimand PSB was encouraged to learn recently that another eight constables will join the detachment in Cayuga in September. Even so, that will leave the Haldimand detachment about four officers short.

Travale was also careful to steer criticism away from the detachment level. Travale has been assured that recruitment efforts at the Norfolk OPP are serious and ongoing.

The Ministry of the Solicitor-General wants to remain above the fray. In an email, spokesperson Stephen Warner says the Ford government "cannot direct police operations, including deployment."

"We have confidence in Ontario's policing leaders, including local detachment commanders and OPP Commissioner (Thomas) Carrique to address operational concerns that police services boards may have."

Warner adds the province pays 99 percent of the OPP's annual \$1.1 billion budget. Municipalities cover the remaining 1 percent.

Warner says 75 percent of municipalities under contract to the OPP pay less than the \$359 average cost-per-property under the current billing method. In Norfolk County, the annual cost-per-property is \$405. The cost of policing in Norfolk this year is about \$12.2 million.

"Municipalities are responsible for ensuring adequate and effective policing," Warner said. "Police service boards have the authority to provide policing personnel the tools and resources they deem necessary to ensure community safety in the jurisdictions they serve."

Warner says the Ontario Police College in Aylmer has devised methods for delivering training safely during the COVID-19 pandemic. He says basic constable training classes resumed in Aylmer this month.

Hello everyone. I do trust this note finds you well. I wish to share with you a matter of interest relating to the process by which Provincial Appointees are named to Police Service Boards. Recently, a member Board in Zone 2 was notified by the Ministry of the Sol./Gen. that a candidate had been identified to serve on the Board. The successful individual resides outside the Municipality in which this particular Board had jurisdiction. This fact caused some consternation for the Board in question. In reply to this event the Chair of the Board sought my input while at the same time sending off a notice to the Ministry seeking clarification. The Board was dismayed for two reasons, one the individual resided outside the Board's mandate and the Ministry had not notified the Board of it's preference . The Board asks, can a Provincial appointee reside outside the jurisdiction of the Board? The short answer is YES. The Ministry response was unequivocal,,, Section 27 PSA (1990) does not make residency in the subject municipality a requirement for police service board applicants. Once the Community Safety and Policing Act (2019) comes into effect that provision may change or not. The Board's argument had nothing to do with personality but rather with qualification. The candidate resides in a rural community and now will join a Board responsible for an urban environment. The Board will move forward to have the candidate sworn in , trained and brought up to speed on outstanding policing issues in the Municipality.

Perhaps other members have similar experiences or perhaps assumed Provincial appointee were drawn from within and not beyond. Well there you have it.
